Situational Update – Incident Level 2 - Operational Period 15 (6/11/2020 – 6/25/2020).

Disease Transmission/Contact Tracing:

There are no new resident or nonresident cases in Juneau today. Contact tracing capability remains unconstrained.

Testing:

Staff and supplies are unconstrained.

Hospital Response:

BRH reports adequate supply of PPE and no concerns related to workforce availability.

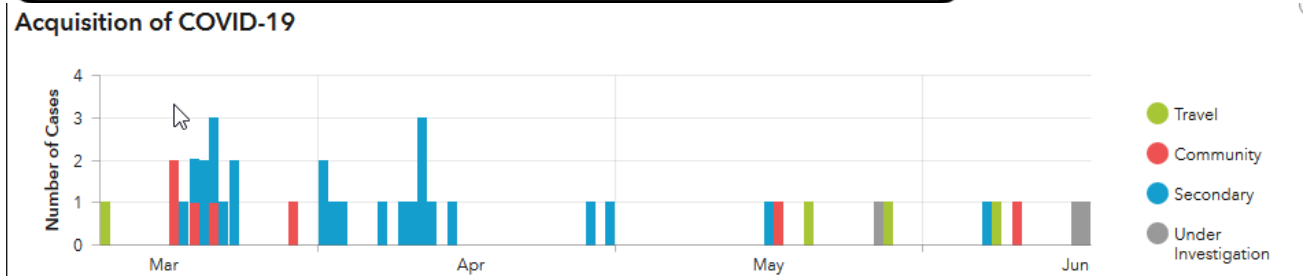
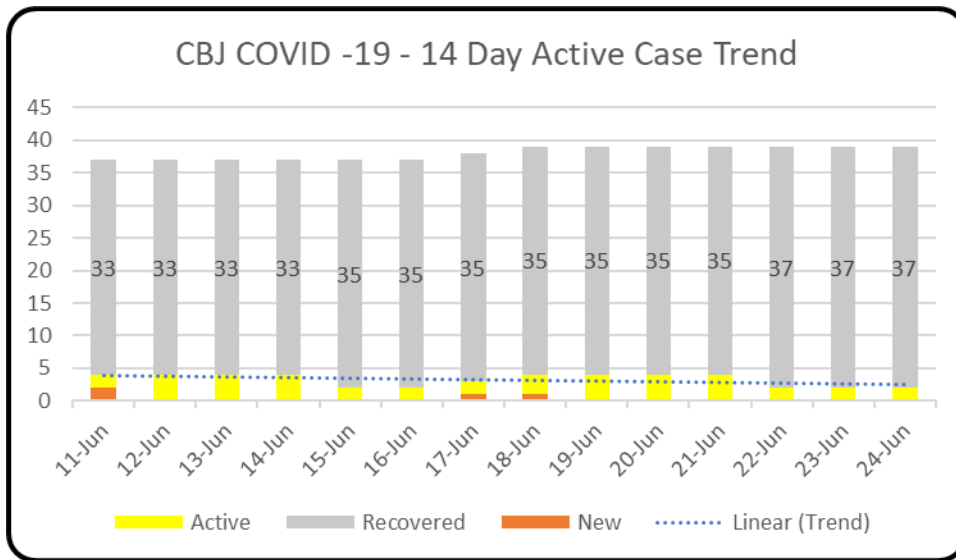
Issues of Note:

Unified command made the decision to meet on a bi-weekly basis while numbers remain low. Our next unified command meeting will be July 8th. CBJ EOC members will continue to meet more frequently.

See notes below about BRH and JSD. We continue to work on testing strategies and refining airport operations. Working with the state to get a “lab on line” function that will streamline the reporting of travel tests.

Wednesday Focus – BRH and JSD Operations

BRH:

BRH continues to work on testing equipment strategies. They are actively demobilizing the RRC building to get back to regular business. This will be done in a way that allows it to be stood up quickly if there is a surge and need for alternate care emerges. RRC will be able to take 6 residential treatment and 4 detox residential patients due to social distancing standards. However, they’ve been working with the state to expand the ability to provide partial hospitalization services which allow them to provide treatment to people who return to their homes at night. Overall, BRH believes it will be able to serve more people under the new model.

JSD:

JSD continues to work toward creating a workable back to school model “Smart Start 2020.” They anticipate finalizing the model shortly and provide training to staff and communication out to families.
