

The City Museum will kick-off 2018 with a solo artist exhibit by Juneau resident and Tsimshian carver, Abel Ryan.


"This exhibit, *Seeing Faces*, is of pieces both new and older. The main focus is on faces, mainly masks. Masks are used to transform us into other beings and to tell stories of other people and great beings. Image of the self is also important and so not everything here are masks. Some things here are about reflection, projection, and self exploration. This is about seeing faces, but also about what faces see," states Ryan.

Born in Ketchikan, Ryan is a member of the wolf clan and a member of the Metlakatla Indian community. He studied carving with master carver Jack Hudson of Metlakatla and has a Bachelor of Arts degree from Sheldon Jackson College and a Native Arts Studio and Printmaking degree from the University of Alaska Fairbanks. For 30 years he has been a practicing Northwest Coast artist working in wood and silver carving and teaching for over 25 years.

Seeing Faces will open with a First Friday Reception on January 5th, 2018, and run through February 24th. Ryan's artwork will be for sale. Additionally, Ryan will speak about his journey as a carver as part of the Museum's Coffee and Collections program on January 13th, 2018 from 10:30 to 12:00 noon.

NEW BOOK BY LOCAL AUTHOR IN MUSEUM GIFT SHOP

T.J. Richardson: Alaska's Pioneer Artist, 1884-1914, by local author and Alaskan historian, M.J Kirchhoff, is available for purchase through the Museum Gift Shop. This fascinating biography is the result of Kirchhoff's incredible discovery of Richardson's personal photo album and letters. Kirchhoff incorporates both the photographs and letters alongside Richardson's expressive watercolors and pastels- creating a glimpse into the artist's life around the turn of the last century. For nearly thirty years between 1884 to 1914, Richardson traveled to Alaska creating beautiful artwork of glaciers and Native villages which are represented in museums across the country. COLLECTIONS CORNER

As many of you are aware, changes to the permanent galleries are on-going as we spruce up existing exhibits and add new ones that represent our culture and history of our multi-faceted and dynamic community.

The halibut float from our permanent collection has recently been installed in our Juneau Fishing exhibit, making that exhibit complete. Also, if you haven't stopped by, put on an apron, and checked out the life-sized hands-on fish-fact panels in the fishing exhibit, then you are missing out! In our Hands-On Mining Room, the Milling exhibit has been updated to include mill balls from our permanent and education collections, as well as history on the two types of mills used by the Treadwell and Alaska-Juneau Mines.

Mid-last year, the City Museum received funding from the Alaska State Museum's Grant-In-Aid program to design, fabricate, and install an updated *Wood and Waterways* exhibit in our General History Gallery. This exhibit focuses on Tlingit canoe making, paddle carving, and canoe transportation.

Over the past few months, we have been working with the Exhibit AK team to make this exhibit a reality. We are exhibiting Tlingit canoe making techniques to highlight our c.1900 16-foot Spruce Dugout Canoe (Shéiyi Seet) and other utilitarian objects in our permanent collection.

In addition to objects and history, we are working with Exhibit AK to produce two hands-on matching interactives to demonstrate and educate on canoe making and types and uses of canoe paddles. We are excited to include a video of the summer 2014 North Tide Canoe Kwáan Journey from Haines to Juneau led by Master Carver, Wayne Price of Haines that offers all boat lovers a look at how well canoes travel in the water and celebrates the resurgence of canoeing in our Southeast communities. We are very excited to bring this exhibit to our galleries and hope you all enjoy it as much as we have enjoyed working on it.

I'll make sure to keep everyone informed on other upcoming changes, but always keep an eye out for new things in our galleries when you visit.






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FRIENDS OF THE JUNEAU-DOUGLAS CITY MUSEUM 2018 MEMBERSHIPS AVAILABLE

2017 was an active year for the Friends of the Juneau-Douglas City Museum. The board along with community supporters reaffirmed the Museum's relevance in the community by showing overwhelming support for the facility and the collections during difficult city budgeting discussions. The Friends facilitated and donated to re-instate the Museum Program Coordinator position to a full-time position with support from The Gaguine Foundation, Michelle and Robert Storer, and Alison E. Browne. The Friends board with the generous support from community donors facilitated the purchase of *Bend in the River* by Sydney Laurence, c.1930 in memory of William D. De Armond, JDCM 2017.45.001. Additionally, the Friends were awarded funds by the Empty Chair committee to re-grant to schools to pay for busses for an educational visit to the Museum.

Through the years, the FoJDCM has sponsored important Museum acquisitions such as *Early Morning Juneau*, oil on canvas by Sydney Laurence, c.1920-24, JDCM2010.24.001; *Meherin Cabin*, oil on board, by Ted Lambert, 1936, JDCM2012.01.001; and *Alaska Native Brotherhood Koogeinaa (sash) and Cap*, made by Frank Alby, 2016, JDCM2016.20.001-2016.20.002. Most recently, 3 unfinished Herb Bonnet paintings and 1 KINY poster were donated by the FoJDCM and purchased with 'Bill's Cache', in Memory of William D. De Armond.

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UPCOMING TEMPORARY EXHIBITS

January-February: Seeing Faces by Abel Ryan

Abel Ryan's *Seeing Faces* solo artist exhibit will open with a First Friday Reception on January 5th, 2018, and run through February 24th, 2018. Ryan describes carving as a personal journey: "It is not just about the object that is created and everyone sees when you are finished. To the carver, it is about the process of getting there. I have always enjoyed carving, especially masks, not because it is easy, but because it is challenging and forces me to be observant and reflective."

Ryan's artwork will be for sale at the Museum during the exhibit.

Discover Tech: Construction of the Juneau-Douglas Bridges & Capitol

The Juneau Public Libraries will host the second national tour of the interactive traveling exhibit *Discover Tech: Engineers Make a World of Difference.* In conjunction with that traveling exhibit, the Juneau-Douglas City Museum will feature two local construction related exhibits. The exhibit in the Map Case Gallery will focus on the construction of the 1935 and 1980 Douglas Bridges, showing photographs from both construction projects and telling the history of the bridges. In the Video Room, we will exhibit history and photographs of the construction of the U.S. Federal and Territorial Building (now the Alaska Capitol), as well as competition panels and a model from the 2005 Alaska Capitol Design Competition. Both of the City Museum's *Discover Tech* exhibits will open with a First Friday Reception on January 5th, 2018 and run through December 2018.

Seasons: 14th Annual 12x12 Community Art Exhibit



Each year the City Museum hosts a unique community art exhibit in which artists of all ages are encouraged to create works within the parameters of a square or a cube, measuring 12" x 12" (x 12") including the framing. For 2018, we encourage artists to create on the theme of "Seasons." Museum curator Jodi DeBruyne explains the choice for this year's theme: "During each year's exhibit, we offer the opportunity for artists and visitors to recommend future 12x12 themes and 'Seasons' has been mentioned a few times over the years. The theme lends itself to all artistic mediums and has a variety of meanings -- seasons of the year, seasons of life, the seasonings of cooking, TV series seasons, sports seasons - that offer an abundance of creative opportunities for Juneau's artists." USS *Juneau* CL-52 Presentation Silver Service Set Exhibit runs through mid-April 2018

The USS *Juneau* Presentation Silver Set, on loan from the U.S. Navy, is back out on view. The punch bowl, ladle, two candlesticks, and a few cups are accompanied by the history of the three USS *Juneau* ships, a crew list form the CL-52, a WWII-era Sullivan Brothers Poster, and a photograph of the CL-52. The Presentation Silver was purchased by the City of Juneau and presented as a gift to the USS *Juneau* CL-52 upon her launching by then Mayor Harry I. Lucas and his wife, who attended the New Jersey based ceremony. October 2017 marked the 76th anniversary of the USS *Juneau* CL-52's launching and November 13, 2017 marked the 75th anniversary of her sinking.

Valley Library Satellite Exhibit: *History Mystery* Exhibit runs through mid-April 2018

This interactive exhibit examines ideas about technology in relation to the Juneau Public Libraries' Big Read and Discover Tech projects. From mid-September 2017 through mid-April 2018, several objects from the Museum's Education Collection will be on display at the Valley Library. They are all pieces of technology that were once considered innovative solutions that improved people's quality of life or made a profession's work easier and more accurate. While operational, not all of these objects are still in everyday use, many having been replaced with more technologically-based modern alternatives.

JUNEAU HISTORY WEBSITE: THE CONSTRUCTION OF GLACIER HIGHWAY BETWEEN 1911 AND 1943

George Danner III has created a visual history of the construction of Glacier Highway. On his website titled, *A Historical Pictorial of the Construction of Glacier Highway*, Danner has organized 260 photographs taken between 1911 and 1943 that document the construction of Glacier Highway from present day Harborview Elementary school to Sherwood Lane.

Danner's family came to own these photos as a result of an attentive custodian named Art Paulson. In the late 1950's, Peterson found a photo album in the trash at the Territorial Building (now the Alaska Capitol) in Juneau and he gave it to Danner's father, George Danner, Jr.
