

MUSEUM CASE UPDATE

The English idiom "don't judge a book by its cover" means the worth or value of something isn't in its outward appearance; however, in the world of exhibits and artifacts, a cover is very important.

The Museum's continued work to refresh our galleries to best interpret our community history has been hampered by aging exhibit cases. Over thirty five years old, they were bulky, composed of large sheets of plate glass with no internal lighting, and difficult to access when changing exhibits.

With a Rasmuson Tier 1 Grant supplemented

by generous donations from The Capital City Celebrations 50^{th} Anniversary Committee, Friends of the Juneau-Douglas City Museum, the Mike Blackwell Fund, and The Men's & Women's Pioneers of Alaska, Igloo #6, three new cases are slated to be installed at the Museum in February. We have been working on new exhibits about Juneau businesses, fishing, mining, and Áak'w and T'aakú <u>K</u>wáan history.

Our new cases will allow us to preserve collections, light exhibits appropriately, maximize a small space, change or update exhibits easily, and ensure proper security of exhibits for decades to come. It is true that the contents are the most important, but the cover is too.



IT'JI SHAANÁX: THE GLOWING VALLEY

It'ji Shaaná \underline{x} (the glowing valley) is the Tlingit name for Perseverance Valley located at the base of Mount Juneau or yadaa.at kalé (beautifully adorned face). This exhibit looks at one of our most majestic landmarks, Mount Juneau, through art and recreation. Thirteen paintings and photographs featuring Mount Juneau will be on view along with four pieces of hiking gear, all from the City Museum's permanent collection. The exhibit will open with a First Friday reception on January 6^{th} , 2017 and will be on view through the end of 2017.

GENERAL HISTORY AND HANDS-ON MINING HISTORY GALLERY CHANGES



In September 2016, we began General History Gallery changes. The Angling Artifacts exhibit was deinstalled and the last of our old, wooden exhibit cases was removed. In its place, we installed an Alaska Native Brotherhood/Alaska Native Sisterhood exhibit, using six of the panels Kim Metcalfe helped us produce from her book, *In Sisterhood, The History of Camp 2 of the of the Alaska Native Sisterhood,* for our ANB/ANS Centennial exhibit in 2012. Along with the panels, an ANS Cap, ANB cap, koogéinaa, pin, and Constitution Booklet are on view. The ANB cap and koogéinaa were purchased and donated to the Museum's permanent collection by the Friends of the Juneau-Douglas Museum.

More changes are to come this winter and spring. We are currently working on a new fishing exhibit to complement the existing Montana Creek Fish Trap exhibit. It will discuss Tlingit fishing methods, recreational fishing in Juneau, and the commercial fishing industry, past and present. Both the Montana Creek Fish Trap and the Dan Moeller Cabin exhibits will move to new locations within the General History Gallery to make way for a new case which will hold a Juneau Businesses exhibit, still in development.




The Friends of the Juneau-Douglas City Museum (FoJDCM) is a non-profit organization formed in 2010 to support and enhance the activities of the City Museum. With this mission, each year, the annual meeting and membership campaign offers art and history to our members and community at large. This year, Terrence Cole, professor of history and director of the Office of Public History at the University of Alaska Fairbanks presented in Juneau on his recent publication — *Old Yukon: Tales, Trails and Trials, Memoirs of Judge James Wickersham.* This is the first and only book to discuss Wickersham's storied career as a pioneer judge and later, a congressional representative in the vast, undeveloped Alaska Territory. This book is available as a gift for new and renewing 2017 members at the \$150 level or above.

The FoJDCM makes a substantial difference to the Museum and its operations. 2016 Friends' accomplishments include a \$10,000 contribution toward the purchase of three new museum cases, a successful \$5000 fundraising effort, and the purchase and donation of an Alaska Native Brotherhood Koogeinaa (sash) and cap to the Museum's permanent collection. This year, the Friends have assisted the Museum by supporting a partnership with Auke Bay Post 25, American Legion, for proper flag protocol and care of our historic flags at the Museum site. Additionally,



each year the FoJDCM provides Museum reception sponsorship and coffee and tea for volunteers, radio marketing and news sponsorship, and production and dissemination of *History on the Channel* for Juneau history enrichment.

EMPTY CHAIR BOOK AVAILABLE IN MUSEUM'S GIFT SHOP THIS MARCH

Quiet Defiance: Alaska's Empty Chair Story by Karleen Grummett will be available for purchase from the Juneau-Douglas City Museum's gift shop beginning March 1st. In the book, Grummett relates the histories of several Juneau families and individuals of Japanese descent who were removed from the community and sent to the Minidoka Relocation Camp during World War II. She also explains the background of "The Empty Chair Project," a grass-roots effort to honor all of those who were affected by the relocation through the creation of a memorial at Capital Park. The book will sell for \$12.95 plus tax, and all funds will be donated to the Juneau History Grant.



January—Pol Corvez: North Douglas Highway Mailboxes

A longtime professional photographer, Pol Corvez has been struck by the richness and variety of mailboxes on North Douglas Highway. To Corvez, the mailboxes reflect the values of each household as well as the community. The objects used to decorate the mailboxes tell a story about the residents, their history, their daily newspaper, hobbies, values, esthetics, and sense of humor. The opening reception for Corvez's exhibit will be held on First Friday, January 6, 2017, from 4:30-7:00 pm. The exhibit will run through Saturday, January 28, 2017.

January—Aleria Jensen and Jonas Lamb: A Braided Way: Poetry, Parenting & Place

An exhibition by poets Aleria Jensen and Jonas Lamb featuring a collection of broadside poems on parenting and place, paired with montages of artwork by their children. (A broadside is a single page with text, intended for hanging on a wall, which may be paired with art work, either by the poet or in collaboration with a visual artist.) The writing in this exhibit explores moments and musings that inform the authors' experience of raising families in Southeast Alaska. Specifically, these poems are windows into family life and parenting against the backdrop of culture and community in Juneau, as well as the marine rainforest environment we call home. The opening reception for the exhibit will be held on First Friday, January 6, 2017, from 4:30-7:00 pm. Work will be on display in the Video Room Gallery through February 25, 2017.

January—Fumi Matsumoto

Fumi Matusmoto is a local Japanese-American artist. She says she "has always been influenced by Japanese culture and history, perhaps because I was born in Japan in 1948 and came to America in 1952 at the age of four." Much of her art "reflects the Japanese aesthetic and often the Japanese American experience." Her art was featured in the City Museum's 2014 summer exhibit, *The Empty Chair: The Forced Removal & Resettlement of Juneau's Japanese Community, 1941-1951.* Thanks to the Rasmuson Foundation Art Acquisition Fund, the City Museum has added three mixed media art pieces by Matsumoto to our Permanent Collection. Those three works will be on display in our entry way case starting in January 2017 and will run through the end of June 2017.



February—Ernest Gruening Cabin 2015 Artists-in-Residence Exhibit

In 2015, Alaska State Parks kicked off its first-ever Artist-In-Residence program at Ernest Gruening State Historical Park near Juneau. The program ran from June through September, with seven artists (Dianne Anderson, Constance Baltuck, Nancy Angelini Crawford, Kurt Jacobson, Jim Leach, Puanani Maunu, and Mark Vinsel) selected from across the state who spent up to two weeks each at the Gruening Cabin. The Museum is pleased to host an exhibit of selected work created or inspired from these artists' time at the cabin. The First Friday opening for the Gruening Cabin exhibit will be held on February 3, 2017 from 4:30-7:00 pm. The exhibit will run through Saturday, February 25, 2017.

March —13th Annual 12X12 Community Art Exhibit: Ink

Each year the City Museum hosts a unique community art exhibit in which artists of all ages are encouraged to create works within the parameters of a square or a cube, measuring 12" x 12" (by 12") including the framing. Each piece of art must be accompanied by a completed entry form and a \$12.12 submission fee. Our exhibit theme changes every year, and this year we encourage you to create on the theme of 'Ink'.



Submissions for the exhibit will be accepted at the Museum starting Tuesday, February 21st through Saturday, February 25th, between 10 am and 4 pm. 

COLLECTIONS CORNER: REFERENCE COLLECTION HIGH SCHOOL YEARBOOKS

The City Museum's Reference Collection Yearbooks are now available online through the Museum's website: http://www.juneau.org/library/museum/HighSchoolYearbooks.php

In the fall of 2016, the City Museum was able to digitize the 76 high school yearbooks in our reference collection through the OCI High School Yearbook Project, a project located in Oklahoma and free of charge to the Museum. Pages of each yearbook have been scanned as JPEG images and provided to the Museum on CDs. The Museum turned the images into PDFs in order to make them easily accessible to the public. The PDFs are not searchable, but do allow you to "flip" through the yearbooks digitally.
