

There's something fishy going on at the City Museum...




Through the generosity of the Sealaska Corporation, and support from the Alaska Humanities Forum, The Juneau-Douglas City Museum will be reconstructing a full-scale replica of the Montana Creek fish trap this January, 2006.

To enhance the interpretation and understanding of the trap's original function, and to examine and discuss outstanding questions about the trap and its use, the Museum will construct a full-scale replica to be hung above the While remarkably original. well preserved, the archaeological remains of the Montana Creek fish trap are crushed and the back end of the trap did not survive. A full-scale replica will allow the public to see what the trap originally looked like and will complement the community history lesson that began

when the original trap was excavated in 1991. Secondary to its purpose as an interpretive aid, the replica will be accessioned into the permanent collection to guarantee its preservation.

The museum has chosen Janice Criswell and Steve Henrikson to build the replica. As a team, Criswell and Henrikson have designed and executed a 1% for art commission of a basketry fish trap for the Craig high school that was inspired by the excavation work they did with the Montana Creek fish trap. We have worked very hard to bring the fish trap and replica to the public. We believe that the sophistication of the people who built and used this trap, and the community who saved it, is a story worth telling. We are very proud to play a part in preserving this story.

Reconstructions February 3-25, 2006



Bob King Preserves Starr Hill Sculpture

Civic pride is alive and well up on Starr Hill. When Bob King started asking around last April about the Living Together in Peace sculpture by Judd Mullady at the top of the Fifth Street Stairs near Kennedy Street, little did we know the lucky artwork was in for a top-notch conservation treatment! Originally designed by Judy Cooper, the 18-foot wooden sculpture, of three men, three women, and a bear was in rough shape... Moss, lichens, and mold made the sculpture look older than its 14 years, and threatened its long term survival. Starr Hill resident Bob King took a look at the treatment report from the "Harnessing the Atom" totem pole from the Juneau-Douglas City Museum, and with \$200 from the Museum's Emergency repairs of Public Art budget to buy supplies, he was off and running. With regular feedback from the Museum, King was able to clean, repair, and apply preservative and water repellant to the sculpture. Beyond this, he researched the story of its creation and dug up additional information about its history

and care from neighbors and even the postman! In his report, King mentions:

"During the cleaning and treatment process, many neighbors and other passers by stopped to chat about the work, including some tourists off the cruise ships...The fact that I was repeatedly asked about the missing part of the arm that I removed for safekeeping and later reattachment showed how attached Kennedy Street residents were to their local piece of public art. Many offered tidbits of information about the piece. Marguerite Fio-

rella cleaned the sculpture previously, Don Kussart said the portion of the arm that broke off during my cleaning was the same piece he had glued on several years earlier...Suzie Cohen said she spotted some kids attempting to vandalize the sculture last year. She stopped them and called their parents. A postman named Buddy said he knew Mullady and identified one of the names listed on the memorial-Anita Louise Brown Verdol- as a former resident of 501 Kennedy, the house across the street from the sculpture."

In November, Bob King presented to the Museum a copy of his report on paper and CD along with copious documentation photographs. The Museum commends Bob King's marvelous work and the devotion of Starr Hill residents to their local artwork.

FRED MACHETANZ PAINTING at CITY MUSEUM



Kelly Gagnon has generously given the Juneau-Douglas City an original Fred Machetanz painting (outside the scope of our collections) with the purpose of establishing a Museum endowment fund. She gave the painting in memory of her late husband, Paul Luis Gagnon. It is an original 1990 oil

painting on masonite called "Land of Long Shadows," featuring a dogsled and mountain scene in its original driftwood frame. The painting has an appraised value of \$22,500. Fred Machetanz (1908-2002) was one of the preeminent Alaskan painters of the 20th century, well-known and much beloved for his portrayal of the people, animals, and landscape of the arctic. A traveling retrospective of his work, "A Northern Adventure: The Art of Fred Machetanz" was on exhibit at the Alaska State Museum this past summer. If you are interested in purchasing this beautiful artwork and helping the Museum develop an endowment fund, please speak with Museum Director Jane Lindsey.
