

6 MEMBERSHIPS AVAILABLE Renew or Purchase Today fojdcm.org/support/ (907) 586-3572 In the fall of 2018, our longtime Juneau-Douglas City Museum volunteer and Friends of the JDCM board member, Mike Blackwell, introduced the idea of sponsoring an annual \$5000 prize recognizing an outstanding work of art or literature. He wanted to name it the "Marie Darlin Prize" in honor of its namesake who was also a dedicated volunteer, Juneau historian, and community advocate until her death in June of 2018. Mike not only wanted to highlight the excellence of artistic and written work about this region, he wanted to "put the Juneau-Douglas City Museum on the map" as an institution that values artists and writers. And the prize will specifically honor those whose work, through a vision and shared sense of community, expresses a commitment to women's rights, social history, and community advocacy.

Mike spearheaded the fundraising for this prize through the Juneau Community Foundation and together the City Museum, the Friends of the JDCM, and a host of donors have established an endowment at the Foundation that will yield an annual income to support his vision. When Mike unexpectedly died in January 2019, a committee was formed to finalize the parameters of the prize and put in place a process for submission and selection. Many thanks goes out to Amy Skilbred, Robin Walz, and Mary Lou Madden for their assistance with this undertaking.

In November, a little over one year after Mike first presented this idea, the City Museum is ready to open the Marie Darlin Prize to submissions. We hope you will join us this year at the Friends of the Juneau-Douglas City Museum's annual meeting on Thursday, November 7th at 5:30pm here at the City Museum as we launch this new collaborative endeavor. Director's Letter



Looking back over the 43 year historical evolution of the Juneau-Douglas City Museum, I am struck by just how plucky this institution has been since its founding by community initiative in 1976. Before moving into our home at the Veteran's Memorial Building 30 years ago, the City Museum

relocated four times in the first 13 years, survived periods with no facility, and persevered despite various cuts to hours, staff, and funding over the years. At one point in the late 80's, the Assembly mandated a reduction to admission fees from \$1.50 to \$1.00 and then to "Donations Requested" and still the City Museum thrived with increased visitation and revenues during that same period. It's a true testament to the dedication of this community to want to preserve our cultural heritage and community memory.

This rise in visitation and revenue has continued as the number of tourists has increased. This May through September season at the museum has seen over 16,500 visitors, a 6% increase in visitation over last summer, and admission and merchandise revenue grew by 24% and 41% respectively over last summer. While this may not be too surprising given the upward trend of cruise ship visitors, it still speaks to the plucky nature of the museum, because none of this would be possible without the assistance of our 30 or so volunteers giving around 1400 hours of service this summer which is on average about 64 hours a week. Our volunteers greet visitors, collect admission fees, share knowledge and information about our community, and provide historical walking tours of downtown and the Capitol.

Some of these hard working volunteers have been with us for more than 20 years and sadly, two of our most dedicated and longest serving volunteers passed away of late but their legacy remains. Mike Blackwell and Marie Darlin continue to inspire us through their many contributions but their absence leaves a gap and I find myself asking who will emerge to fill that gap and in what way? And there is no guarantee that the City Museum won't face similar challenges to those of the past. But our mission reminds me daily that our plucky past gives us strength and perspective and drives our future purpose. I hope you'll take advantage of our sponsored free admission throughout winter to take in the new exhibits and learn something interesting during a program. And while you are here, I look forward to hearing what you most value about the City Museum.

Broken window glass, rusted objects, abandoned shrimp pots, discarded construction materials, textiles, and beach detritus are all incorporated her pieces and Rachael highlights the beauty found in these items by reimagining their purpose, assembling them into visually stunning works of art.

Inari Kylänen






February 2020 *Summers on Ice,* by Ben Huff

Summers on Ice (working title) is a collection of pictures from Ben's time spent on the Juneau icefield and surrounding glaciers, both on his own expeditions, and as a faculty member with the Juneau Icefield Research Program. This exhibit is a collection of large format black and white portraits, mixed with color aerial photographs of the ice field, camps used by JIRP, and images from the terminus of the Mendenhall and Herbert Glaciers.

The Blackwell Legacy

Matthew and Andrew Blackwell have been kind enough to donate several paintings, a print by Jay Crondahl, and one print by Dale DeArmond in memory of their late father, Mike Blackwell. Mike was a dedicated supporter of the Juneau-Douglas City Museum and his loss has been keenly felt.

The artwork by both Crondahl and DeArmond depict unique Juneau scenes. We are grateful to have them in our collections.

A Unique Keepsake

Winter & Pond are possibly the best known historical photographers in Juneau. In addition to photographing subjects all over Alaska, they ran a curios

shop and photography studio in downtown Juneau. One of the items they sold were photo albums of their original photos. This album from 1909 depicts notable buildings and cityscapes of the early 1900s and although I have seen a number of Winter & Pond photos, I have never seen an album like this.

Collected by a serviceman stationed in Juneau in the 1940s, it made its way to California where he eventually settled. His son, Martin Posner, found it among his effects after the passing of his father and Mr. Posner felt the album should return home to Juneau. I am happy to add it to our permanent collection.

Spring-Summer Programs Highlight



Walking Tours, Music and Play

This summer over 1,700 people attended a tour offered by the City Museum. Because of our outstanding cadre of volunteer tour guides, the Museum was able to offer daily tours of the Capitol, weekly tours of Historic Downtown Juneau, and several special walking tours including: *Treadwell Mine* led by Jim Geraghty, *True Crimes: Capital Killers* led by Betsy Longenbaugh and Ed Schoenfeld, and the *Downtown Geology* walk led by Cathy Connor and Richard Carstensen. In addition, the Museum hosted local musicians, monthly First Friday events, and provided a history touch table and "crankie" workshop for local families on Day of Play. A total of eleven volunteers joined us this season: five Capitol tour guides and six greeters at the front desk.

Museum Outreach

Teaching Local History with Hands-On Education Kits

In 2018 the City Museum applied for and was awarded a grant through the Alaska State Museum's Grant-In-Aid to contract with local educators to create place-based and hands-on history kits as resources for K-12 educators. This resulted in the following six kits which will be available to check out through the public libraries this fall:

- Observing and Learning from Artifacts (Grades K-4)
- Totem Pole: Oral Narrative in Art Form (Grades 1-3)
- Discovering Treadwell (Grades 2-3)
- L'eiwú ka Héen: Wood & Waterways: A Look at Tlingit Canoes (Grades 3-5)
- Kaxdegoowu Héen Sháali: Montana Creek Fish Trap (Grades 3-5)
- Local Disasters (Grades 6-12)

In addition to kit development, this project included a three hour training for the contracted educators on how to effectively partnership with museums; a three hour workshop in which the kit designers presented their kits to the group and received feedback; and a presentation by City Museum staff and kit developers to Juneau teachers during a district-wide inservice in August.

After the August inservice, we received several calls from teachers eager to check out the kits. We are thrilled to provide quality resources for educators to support teaching and learning about the history of Juneau and Douglas.

Holly Fisher fulfilled an internship at the Museum this spring as part of her Archives and Museums Methodology course at UAS. Working closely with Curator, Niko Sanguinetti, Holly received hands-

on experience in museum curation and collections care. Holly learned how to handle and catalogue artifacts and she helped install the summer exhibit. Holly graduated from UAS in June 2019 and stayed on at the City Museum as a temporary employee through September, 2019.
