










How frequently do you use Capital School Park? 210 responses




How do you access Capital School Park? 209 responses



What type of amenities do you use when you visit Capital School Park? (Mark all that apply) 206 responses




Why do you visit Capital School Park? 208 responses






How interested are you in providing outdoor fitness equipment? 209 responses






Rank your agreement with the following statement: It is important to further recognize and interpret the cultural features of the park.




Rank your agreement with the following statement: Musical Instruments should be incorporated into the Park Programming.




Rank your agreement with the following statement: A space for Community Gardening should be incorporated into the Park Programming.





As someone who lives downtown, when I think of what I want this park to be I think: bright, accessible, reflective of the community

As someone who's lived next to the park for 6 years, it is extremely important to families living downtown as space for their kids and dogs especially to play and blow off steam. Similarly, it's crucial for the local day care location, judging by the playing I hear every day! Older kids and adults use the basketball area frequently. I think those are the groups that should be prioritized in the park. Anything additional to bring in other groups is good, too. As to the community garden idea, it needs to be made safe (as much as possible) from dogs and cats in the park, and the bears that stroll through in the summer. I know garden plots at chicken yard have been rendered unusable by cats preferring to use them as a litter box.

Assuming this is the local firm I'm generally optimistic about it. Poured in place or the matting from Cope is ideal. Keep the geometry of the sledding hill.

Hello. I live at 536 Seward Street—I step out my front door and right into this park. For the last three years, the house next door (526 Seward Street) has been under major construction. The noise was a terrible, almost-daily nuisance, unbearable at times, particularly on the weekends and when I started working from home more this year. All of that work just finished and the idea of another construction project beginning anytime soon makes my heart sink. I don't know if I could take it. I know that sounds dramatic! But it's true. Also, I have a dog and we use the park every single day, multiple times a day. If the park was closed for any amount of time it would be incredibly inconvenient for us. I do support the idea of improving the park, adding gardens, and incorporating artwork and memorials. But for me, directly on the border of this park, it would be so appreciated if the projects selected did NOT require extensive closures of the park and long periods of work with heavy machinery and equipment. Thank you for the opportunity to provide input.

Hopefully this park will be as inviting to adults as it is to kids. Playground is great. But it will take more to attract adults.

I don't like the way we were supposed to rank uses. I think many of the listed uses could be incorporated into the park. I can't imagine ever removing the Empty Chair exhibit. There's a dog park in Cope Park. Capital School Park needs either real grass or artificial turf. A basketball court would get a lot of use. Don't fill it up with too many play areas other than what's already there. Many more adults would make use of the park if some of it was dedicated to adult uses, too.

I feel very strongly about NOT letting dogs overrun the park. I did not see restrooms on the list for amenities, but at the very least the portapotty is very appreciated.

I have lived above the park for 32 years. Family groups, kids and dogs with owners are probably the biggest users. Also, solo individuals often stop and sit in a private spot. Various exercise classes sometimes meet. I think it's important to keep the area very open, so kids can run and chase while parents keep them in sight. Picnic sites could be somewhat separate from each other for privacy of groups. The Japanese memorial is a special, contemplative spot for many.

I have started a rotating park group every Thursday. The amount of parking you have wouldn't suffice. I would cut down on some of the play turf or children's garden and give more parking. Especially downtown. Many of us come from Douglas.

I hope the park can be a destination for kids to play, families and workers to picnic, tourists to learn about Juneau's heritage in a woodsy setting.

I like the chair memorial but don't want to incorporate plans for new memorials. The sledding hill, climbing equipment and swings are the most important. This is a place to bring kids to play, and maybe have a few benches for the kids watchers. It's been harder for me to bring my grandkids when day care is there. They don't get a turn on the swings and the tot area is full, but I want those kids to play too so I guess we need to build for the day care.

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I live in the brown house in the center of the park survey photo, with a bedroom and home office overlooking the park. I also work in the Terry Miller Legislative Office Building. Every day I visit the park with my seven-month-old daughter, cross the park numerous times, and spend hours watching users of the park. A few comments: (1) Children rather than adults are the superusers of the park, thanks especially to the nearby preschool and to the presence of the sledding hill. The busiest times in the current park design are when the preschoolers are there or when it snows and kids throughout downtown come to sled. (2) Tai chi and aikido groups practice often in the park, either near the empty chair or in the basketball area. They should be consulted in the design process (more below). (3) While it is occasionally fun to hear the sound of a basketball in the park and to see two or more people shooting hoops together, it is uncommon for the basketball area to be used for basketball. While I love the sport of basketball, it is not a popular activity at the park. (4) As a legislative employee myself, I am surprised by how little the park is used by my colleagues. Better signage/wayfinding from the capitol to the park would encourage greater use of the park by legislative personnel and other visitors, especially summer tourists. (5) In and around the park, improved signage/wayfinding would be invaluable to summer visitors. I often see tourists who have become lost in the neighborhood. Most of the new signage is helpful, with the glaring exception of the misdirected/mislabeled new sign at the corner of 5th Street and Gold St, one block from the park, where visitors coming uphill from the cruise ship docks are now mistakenly told to head in the wrong direction if they are seeking the attractions of Basin Road (please tell the right person to fix the directional arrows on this sign). Tourists in the area, including in the park itself, often ask me for directions because they aren't sure which way to go after reaching the park, where many hikers/explorers take a breather or visit the empty chair memorial before heading elsewhere. Having new and improved signs for what is in the park (i.e. for the empty chair) should be coupled with new and accurate wayfinding signs for those who may be interested in heading to points beyond the park.

I live on 5th St and love this park and its historical lilac bush and cultural art which should have permanent signage but I think there needs to be more natural native habitat for local wildlife and less lighting features for less light pollution. The dog walk is important for the neighborhood and I would *****LOVE**** to help with the commmunity garden which should also have a spigot for water for the garden.

I really miss the roses — put back just one somewhere?

I really think you should consider the idea of a parking garage. The current playground could be paved over and a new playground pavilion could be built above it. I don't believe it would greatly obstruct anybody's view and it would satisfy the great need for parking.

I see very little use of the basketball court, but maybe with improvements it would get used more. I think providing some space out of the rain for people to spend time would be nice. I love the trees, historic features, and landscaping that is currently there. Also maybe the retaining wall is an opportunity for some art or murals. The musical features are a nice idea, but need to keep in mind that sound projects from that area and people live in the areas surrounding, so there is potential for that to get very annoying. Incorporating some local themes in the playground structures would be nice, Bozeman, MT just did a very nice job with a new park and playground that serves as a great example (as does our very own project playground).

I think the committee should prioritize a place where families can play and gather, since the next closest place is a school district playground that isn't always available to the public.

I think the plans look great! I use the park frequently and I think these would be great changes! I wish the fenced dog area would keep dogs from pooing on the turf, but unfortunately I doubt it since they already poo on the playgrounds. There is already a large dog park nearby at Cope Park, so I think the precious downtown space should be more focused on facilities for children and youth. I have seen young people using the basketball court so I suppose that's important. The orchard area and roses and maples are unique in town and I hope they won't be compromised for a community garden that only a few can benefit from. The small garden area in the bottom corner has been very neglected when I've gone by and is a bit of an eyesore. Really, a vegetable garden such as that can be anywhere and this space should be focused as a public park rather than trying to fit in everything trendy.

I would love to reduce the use of plastic as much as possible.

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I would love to see a cement bowl and a mini ramp with rails and boxes for grinding

I'm sure you all will do a great job, thank you for being a part of Juneau history!

If artificial turf area was not included that surface could remain dirt for dog activity and playground equipment area could be fenced in. But I am not strongly attached to having an area for dogs here.

I'm a homeowner (our place is close enough that it's in the aerial photo of the park) and use this park nearly daily with two kids, and in the past, dogs, so my comments are coming from that perspective.

My biggest wish is PLEASE, PLEASE, do not use tire crumb or other artificial turf coverings in the park. Regardless of where the scientific literature currently leans on whether this is in fact carcinogenic, it's gross. It doesn't stay where you put it, so it's like filling the park with bits of garbage that get everywhere. In kids areas, please utilize mulch, woodchips, or pea gravel where you need a landing pad. Tire crumb stains clothing, leaves black marks on hands and faces, and yes, kids DO put it in their mouths. It often contains little metal shaving bits that cause small cuts or metal splinters. I can't think of a worse thing to put in a "tot lot."

I would encourage the design team to utilize natural materials and interest as much as possible - yes kids love the slides and swings, but the edible landscaping, big rocks, and climbable hills are also appreciated. The natural hills and paths and "nooks and crannies" of the park are great for hide and seek and exploring and appreciating Juneau's natural beauty downtown - and may houses, including our own, don't have backyards for this kind of outdoor exploration.

A huge turf field in the middle doesn't make a lot of sense considering the usual users of the park: a lot of dog people, kid people, and workers from neighboring offices at lunch, neighborhood friends meeting up - and (maybe again someday) tourists looking for the Empty Chair memorial. Let's use the slope to highlight Juneau's natural beauty and make it a relaxing place to be outside, not surrounded by dog poop (and I have NO idea how to get certain dog people to pick up the poop ... it's bad) and tire crumb and a soccer field very few will use. (I do think a small basketball area is good to keep, though.)

A final thought - the drainage is bad. That flat area turns into a big mud pit, and/or ice rink. The retaining wall seems to have a creek running through it. Can you work WITH the landscape instead of against it? Maybe a little creek bed wouldn't be the worst thing. Big rocks and kids would love jumping it.

Thanks for all this. I think Juneau has amazing Parks and Rec. One day this summer there I noticed there was a broken swing, and it was repaired/replaced so fast. You guys rock. We use the parks, and we appreciate it!

Gardens need to be kid proofed, kids love climbing park trees. Would love to see trails on the back slope with benches, low level lighting. Covered shelter turns into sleeping quarters at night. Not sure about the arbor, doesn't stop the rain, don't need the shade. The park gets used at night and early morning for dog walking, not sure that the small sized dog enclosure would attract many dog walkers, who need the walking exercise with their dogs. Bathroom would be good, but again, a homeless magnet? A half court Basketball court would be nice, but with limited park area, what do we give up? Keep it simple, but very nice!

Keep the handicapped parking!

-regarding the community garden - As an avid gardener myself - I appreciate a community garden; however, I would like to see Capital Park continue as more of a broad-use destination, and believe that the limited space would be better allocated towards workout stations and retaining basketball. Incorporating edible landscaping may be an ideal compromise. A downtown community garden already exists at Chicken Yard Park.

The basketball court is the only one of its kind in downtown Juneau. It should be worked into the plan. The biggest problem for any dog owner in downtown is a place for dogs to run around a bit off leash. Some can't or won't do the staircase to Cope Park and look for the most available option, so many people use Capital park already as an informal dog park. (I saw more dog owners there than I see kids in a given day before COVID.) This could include a covered area for dog owners to huddle underneath as their pups sniff about.

The concrete retaining wall needs to be fixed so it doesn't drop blocks. thanks for all the work you are doing. I love this sort of thing!

The ice from the bad drainage is going to break somebody's hip. Or head. I heard the city was going to fix it in the 2010 park bonds. Fix it now. Oh, and we don't need noise amplifiers ("music devices") in a park near offices. Put them at Twin Lakes and Melville and Chicken Yard, sure. But toddler 'music' is only beautiful to mom & dad. When people are trying to work, it's just a headache. Are you trying to get the state workers to complain and resurrect the horrible idea about making this a parking lot?!? Think about where it is.

the plan looks like a general refresh which is good. the park gets used in all times of weather by different individuals and groups. i like that the park has different pockets for different activities at a time. don't try to over-consolidate those activities (one picnic area for everyone is not the rig. choice.). when the weather is nice it's a nice place to go chill out. if you make everyone chilling out be in the same area of the park it will be first come first served and the rest will move on.

The program wouldn't let me finish the last four items. Said I was repeating sections.

The space is small; put community garden elsewhere. This is only spot I can walk my dog who is afraid of other dogs, so keeping some visibility block is helpful. And please keep dog poop bags and trashcans.

The trend is to include as many user groups as possible, which in the case of Cope Park, led to conflicts and a much less welcoming play area for children. Also, steer away from manufactured at spaces. Most kids are happy with a muddy puddle and a slide and something to balance on. Keep it simple and messy!

There are no welcoming play areas for children under 6 in downtown.

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There have been issues with dogs going bathroom in play area, design to avoid that issue. I'd like to see more tables for people to eat outside when it's nice out. A covered area would be nice, since kids and adults use in all weather. The sledding hill should stay!

There's already a nice community garden at Chicken Yard Park, so that doesn't feel necessary. A basketball court takes up a lot of space, but a hoop could be ok. There are other options for that. A dog park doesn't feel necessary because cope park fits that need. The playground and gathering space for neighborhood residents (like myself) feels most important. I love the chair project and feel proud of that when I walk by everyday. A totem would also be nice. And again...an amphitheater- partially covered with rain/sun shades, with power and some basic lighting could really make it a place for live entertainment (with all the restrictions that of course need to be taken into consideration to make that archievable). We have nothing like that downtown and it's a shame given our robust music and performing arts community. The JAHC block parties for example, have to use the SLAM's bus loop/plaza for crying out loud. It's shameful that we don't have an outdoor venue that works for our climate and community. This seems like a GREAT opportunity to build one into the existing plans for the park.

This park is a bit more like Chicken Yard Park than the others in the downtown area in that it is in the middle of the neighborhood. Making it a place that encourages respectful community based activities is very important.

This park is sorta equidistant from Chicken Yard and Cope parks. It should, ideally, serve a different function. Chicken Yard is trending toward playground and community garden. Cope Park is now designed for dogs, tennis, and biking. Let Capital Park be something different. Think maybe of an elegant European-style park that is used daily by neighborhood residents as an "outdoor living room"-durable well-drained sufaces, seating, turf/lawn, lovely plantings, water features, stage/amphitheatre, etc

This park is typically filled with dog poop. Cope Park is very close and has a dedicated dog area. No Dogs allowed would be the best change for this park. Would be great if park would incorporate live music, think this place is great for summer concerts in the park. Also, the park is fun for young kids but offers little for everyone else. An ideal park would be fun and accessible for all ages and include activities and events for everyone.

This survey was a bit tricky. Not bad, but it could have used a few more test runs. Such as making it clearer that it needed 1-8 was a ranking, not a priority list.

Topography:

The sloping topography of the park can be an asset, rather than a challenge and provides and opportunity to install amenities that are not as feasible at the other (flatter) parks. Some ideas:

- 1)The slope lends itself well to creating an amphitheater-style set of terraces that could act as seating for concerts in the park, political demonstrations, campaign events, neighborhood festivals, cultural celebrations and performances, family movie nights etc.
- 2) zip lines!
- 3) side-by-side super slides!
- 4) sledding hill (We use the one currently in the park every time is snows!)
- 5) Japanese garden (as part of empty chair project) with steps, bridges, pagoda, koi pond/waterfalls.
- 6) children's play area that cuts into the hillside with caves and tunnels (could include historic mining equipment converted into play structures and interactive displays.)

Aesthetics:

Juneau is blessed with natural beauty. Large-scale, brightly-colored play structures really compete with their surroundings visually. Playground equipment does not need to be super ugly (but most are.) Understated, versatile spaces will age much more gracefully than purple plastic castle turrets will.

I beg you to consider an aesthetic that is somewhat cohesive and understated.

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Practicality:

With the exception of the daycare/preschool (since the charter school has moved) currently far more dog owners use the park than any other demographic. There are not many yards in the heart of downtown, so many dog owners use the park to exercise their dogs (off-leash, illegally) with "chuck-its" etc. and as a place for their dogs to regularly go potty.

Cope Park has an awesome dog exercise area, but for whatever reason (probably proximity to home) dog owners are virtually always exercising their dogs off-leash in Capital Park.

The park mainly serves dog owners, daycare providers, tourists, and occasionally political rallies--never sports teams, youth groups, family cook-outs, or hikers. So I think "nature" trails and a turf field are way off the mark.

and as a home owner across the street, I beg you not to install noise makers.

We either need a new skatepark or we need someone to actually upkeep it a little bit

We enjoy the green space, the plants, and the walking trails in the park. I hope that play equipment will be chosen to blend with the natural elements (rather than gaudy colorful plastic features).

We love this neighborhood park, especially with such limited green space downtown. It would be great to see an improved playground especially since the Cope Park improvements were disappointing (turned out to be less than before). Please keep the gaga ball pit!

We would really appreciate a space to have outdoor gatherings such as family picnics that is sheltered from rain
