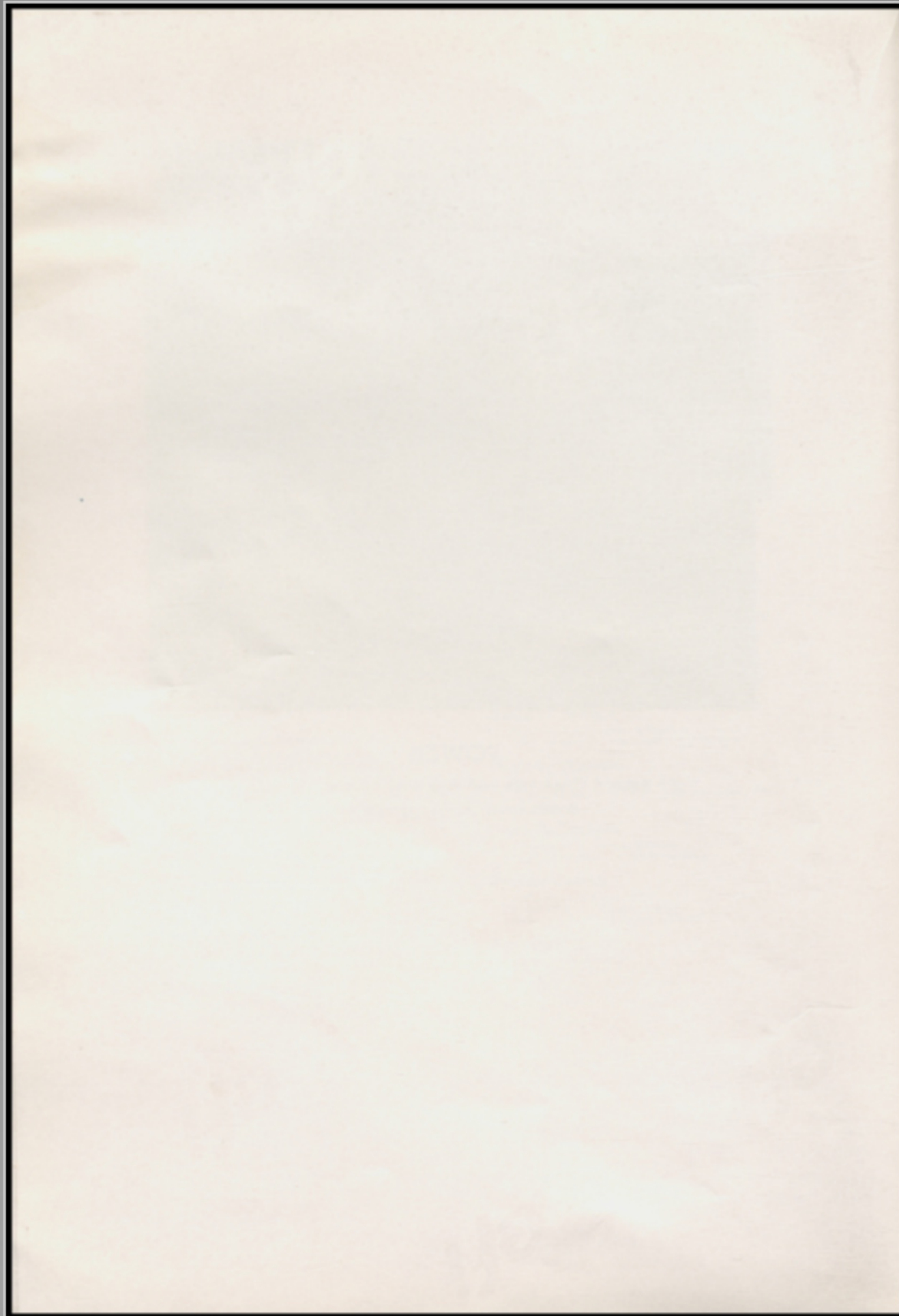

Senior Class History

SEVENTY-FIVE freshmen entered Juneau High School as the class of '43. Of the thirty-seven Seniors that are to be graduated, twelve of this group have attended school in Juneau for thirteen consecutive years.

EVIDENCE of high scholastic standards in the class is shown in the number of Senior members of the Honor Society. Those represented this year were Anna Lois Davis, Bob Phillips, Doris Cahill, Bob Helgesen, Merion Cass, Marie Hanna, Emma Nielsen, Grace Berg, Shirley Davis, and Pat Olson.

NOVELTY themes added variety to the class parties and dances given. The class of '43 made their social debut at their sophomore class party, the theme of which was a novel sports review, the "Sports Cavalcade." The Junior Prom was held amid the gaiety of a circus. A Russian festival, the "Balalaika," was the theme of the Senior Ball.

INTERESTS of the class were varied. All school offices were held by Bob Helgesen, Student Body President for 1942-43; Marilyn Merritt, Student Body Secretary; Skip MacKinnon and Pat Olson, Editors of the Publications; and Harry Sperling, Business Manager of the Publications. In the Quill and Scroll, international society for high school journalists, Harry Sperling served as President, Pat Olson, Vice-President and Marilyn Merritt, Secretary. Others in the class who have shown themselves to be outstanding among the amateur thespians are Betty Nordling, Doris Cahill, Anna Lois Davis, Skip MacKinnon, and Beverly Leivers.

Harry Sperling, Bob Snell, Joe Kendler and Frank Krsul earned their first letters this year. Girls also took their share of athletic awards. Seven Senior girls were holders of major athletic awards and as such are members of the J Club. This school year five Senior girls volunteered their services to help in the school office and proved to be capable and efficient workers.

SCHOOL YEARS having been completed, the Seniors look to the future. Some plan to attend college or business school, some are entering the armed service or defense industries, and others have plans in the business world. All leave with a memory of the many wonderful times enjoyed together and agree that their good times have far outshone and outnumbered the bad.

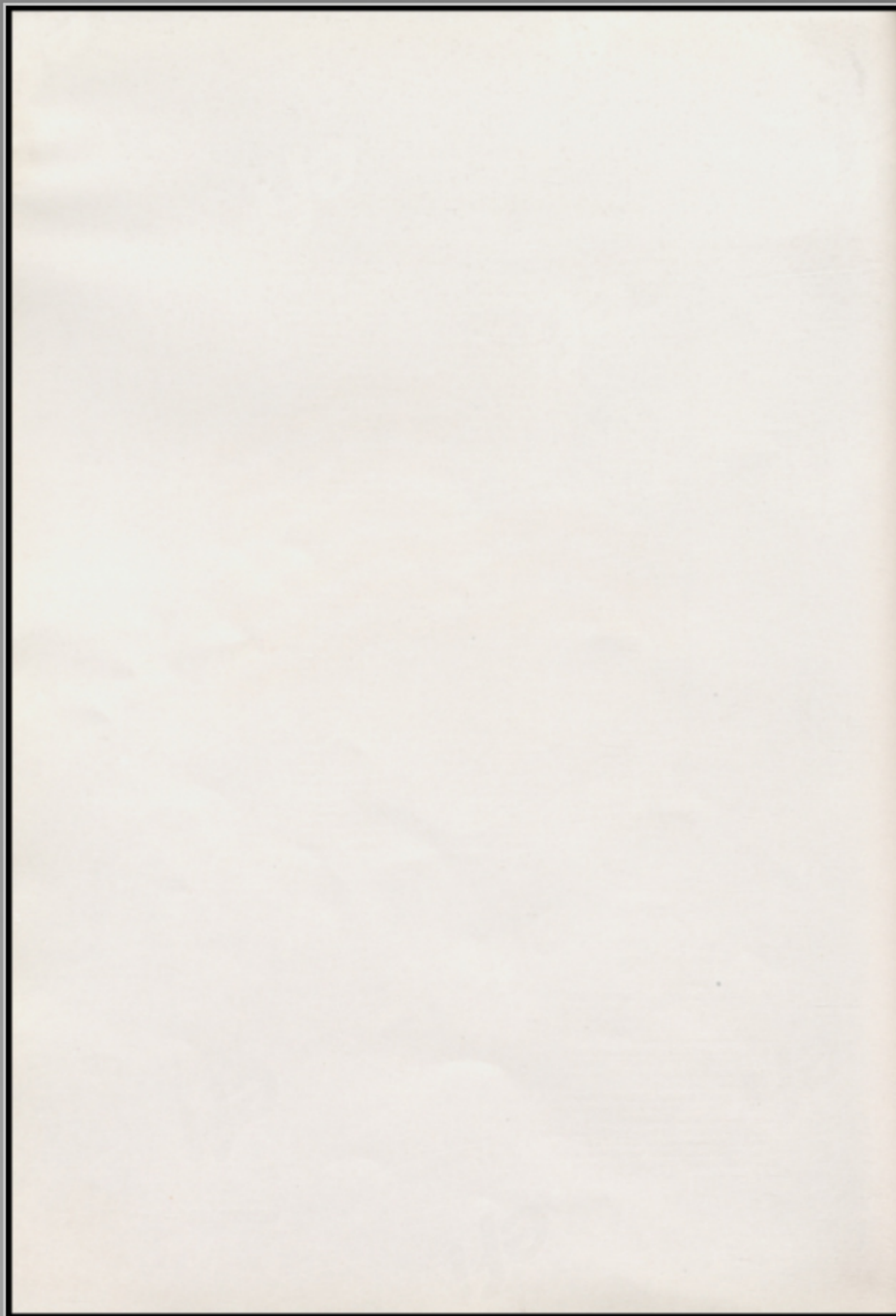

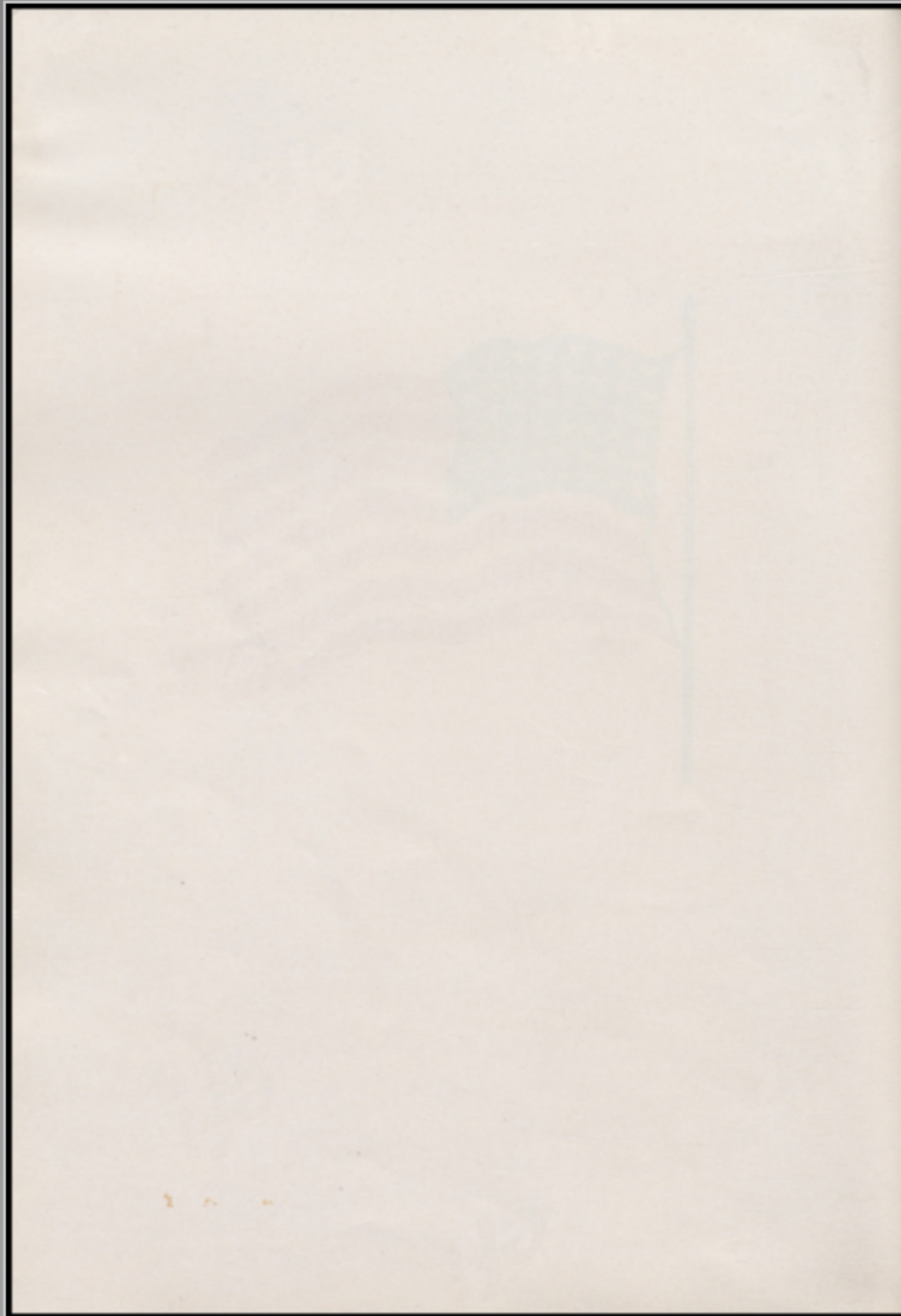

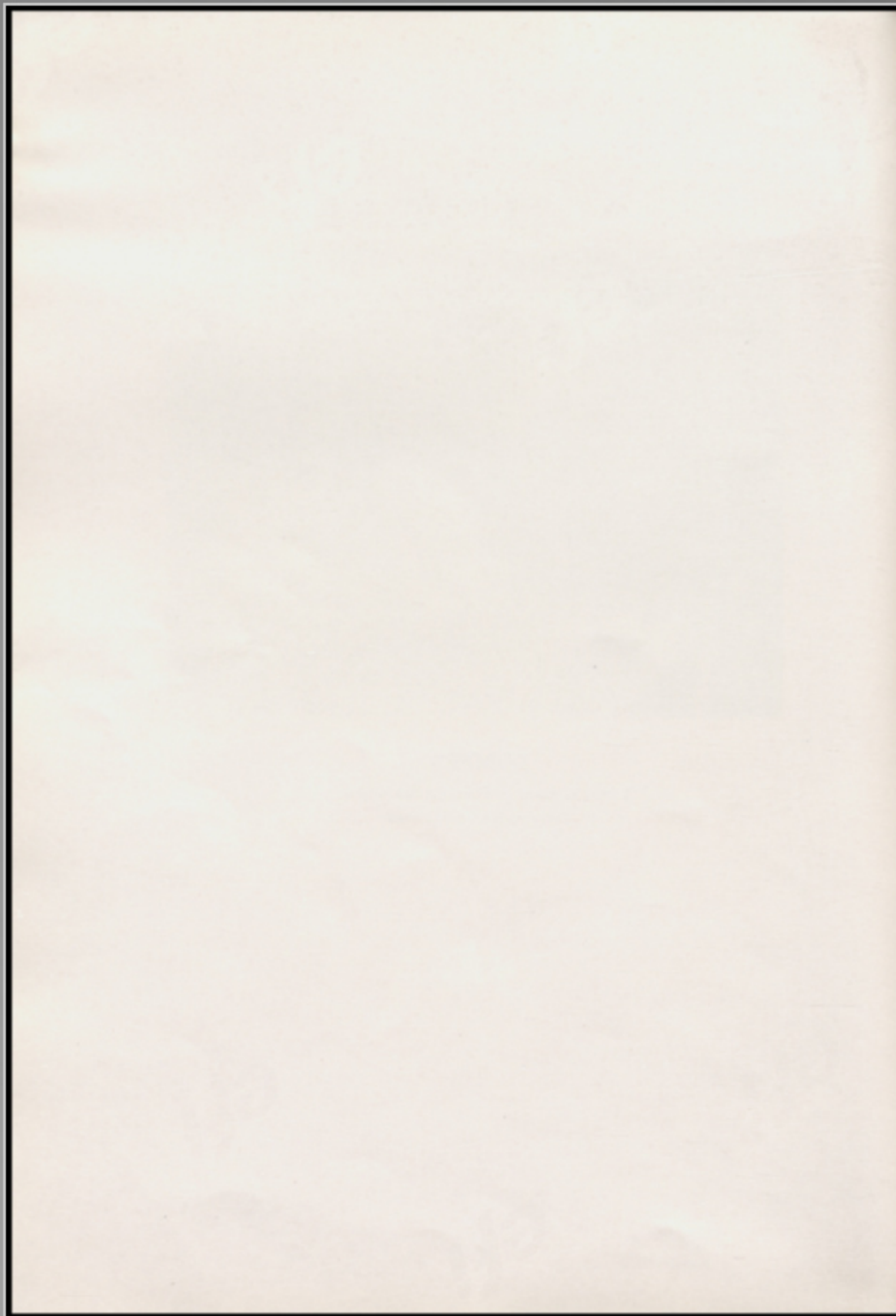

A Murder Has Been Arranged

By special arrangement with Samuel French, a thrilling play entitled "A Murder Has Been Arranged" by Emlyn Williams, was presented to the public on December eighteenth in the high school gym. The play was under the direction of Mr. Richard H. Byrns, dramatics adviser, and student director, Shirley Davis.

On the stage of the empty St. James Theatre in London, Sir Charles Jasper, (Bob Helgesen) plans to give a party celebrating his inheritance of two million pounds from his uncle. Sir Charles, an authority on the Occult in England, is also giving this party to prove the theory of Robert Battersby, an alchemist of the nineteenth century. His theory was that if a person was murdered on the stage of this particular theatre his ghost would arise from his body within ten days of his death and avenge his death by murdering a mute woman. An old man had been found murdered nine days before this party so Sir Charles planned to use his death as a proof of his adopted theory. However, when he is informed that the man hadn't been murdered in the theatre but out in the street, Sir Charles is hit hard but decides to continue with the party anyway.

Jimmy North (Bob Phillips) comes to the theatre to protect Lady Jasper (Pat Davis), Sir Charles' wife from the evils of the deserted theatre.

The arrival of Maurice Mullins (Harry Sperling), Jasper's only living relative, who would receive the fortune should Sir Charles die before eleven P. M., creates a commotion, but is treated lightly by Sir Charles, who thinks him harmless, and Mrs. Arthur (Grace Berg), who thinks he is a very gentle gentleman. The rest greet him with suspicion, except for Sir Charles' secretary, Miss Groze (Inez Soldin), who was Maurice's sweetheart at one time. In a scene that shows his ruthless character, Mullins finally makes Miss Groze agree to help him get rid of Sir Charles.

With a love letter written to Beatrice while she was going to school, Maurice is able to make Charles suspicious of Beatrice and Jimmy. Beatrice decides to leave him because of this lack of faith. With cool deliberation Mullins murders Jasper by poisoning his drink after tricking him into writing a suicide note.

When Sir Charles' body is found by his wife and the cook, Mrs. Wragg (Janet Carl) everyone is certain that he did not commit suicide but was murdered by Maurice for the two million pounds.

The climax is reached when a mute woman (Adrienne Glass) appears in the final act and later is found dead in a passage way of the theatre, thus proving Sir Charles' theory. Beatrice and Jimmy use the appearance of Charles' ghost to trap Maurice, who confesses to the murder as the curtain closes.

Cavendish (Douglas Gregg) is the band leader in the play and led the swing band between acts. Margaret Femmer was business manager, and Skip MacKinnon was stage manager.

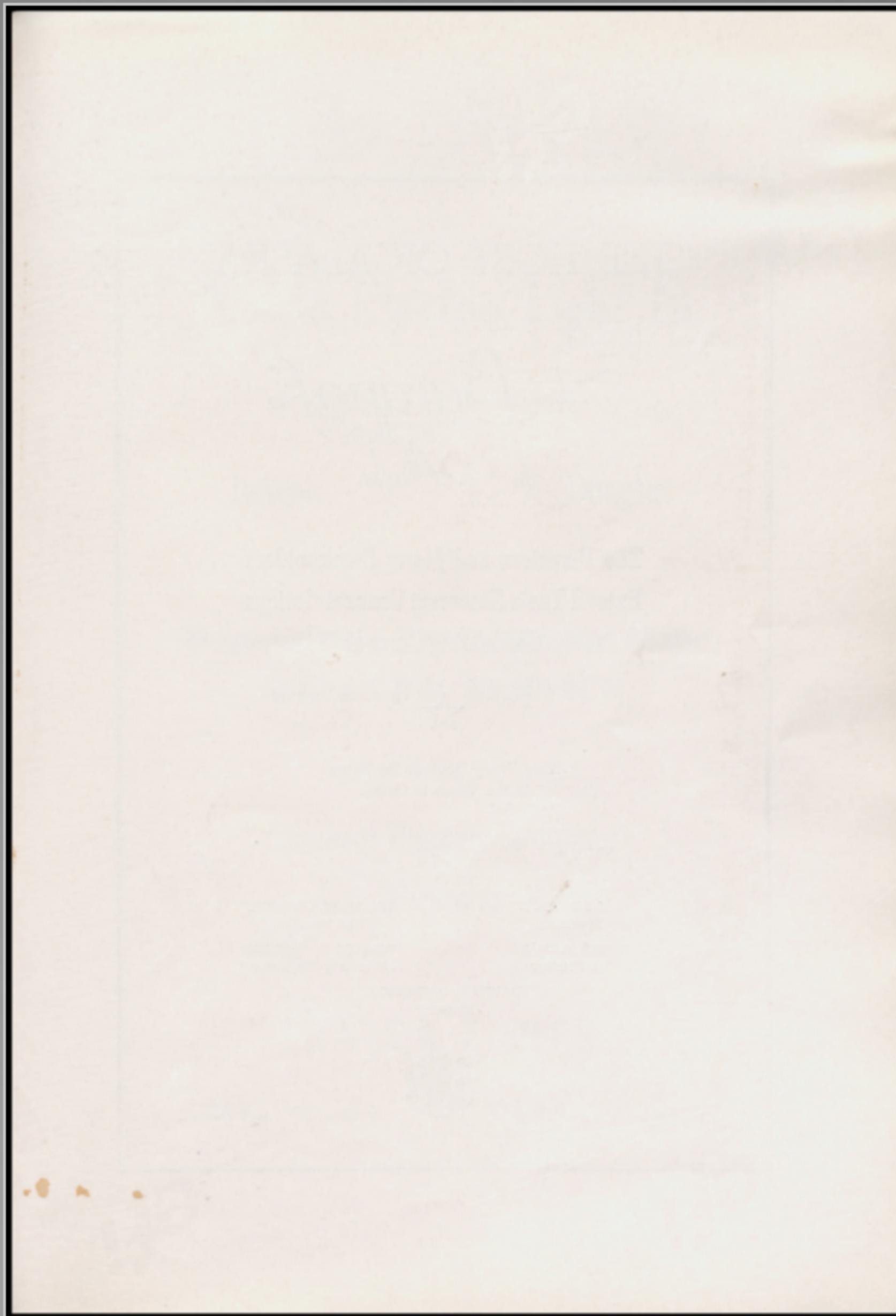
As a grand finale to this highly successful production, the "Ballad for Americans" was joined in by the entire group. The concert was attended by many and rated a great deal of praise.
