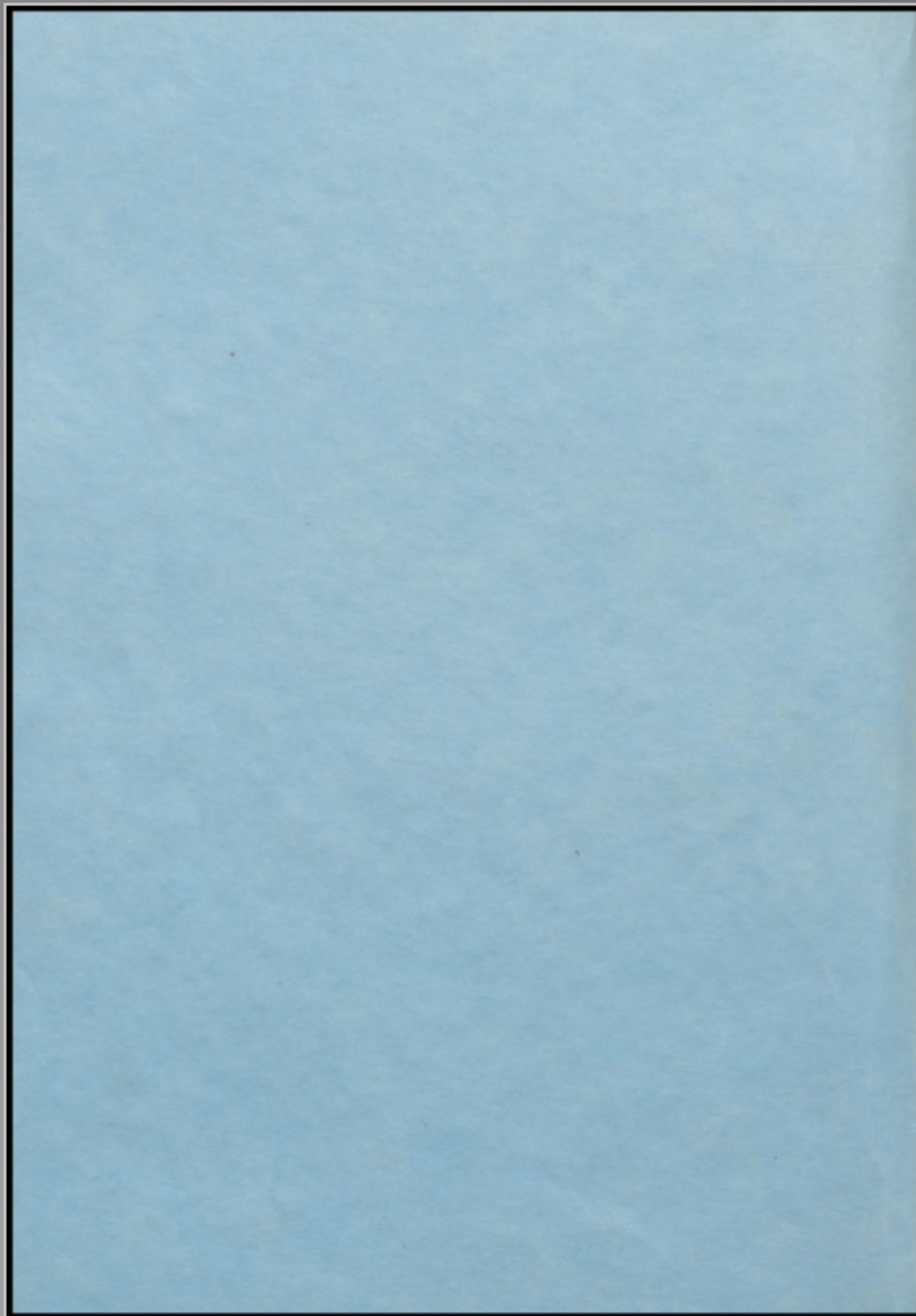

Senior Class History

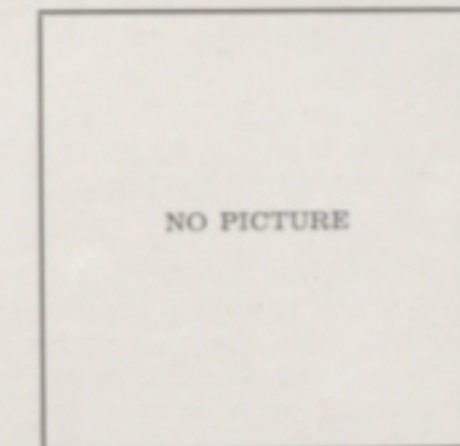

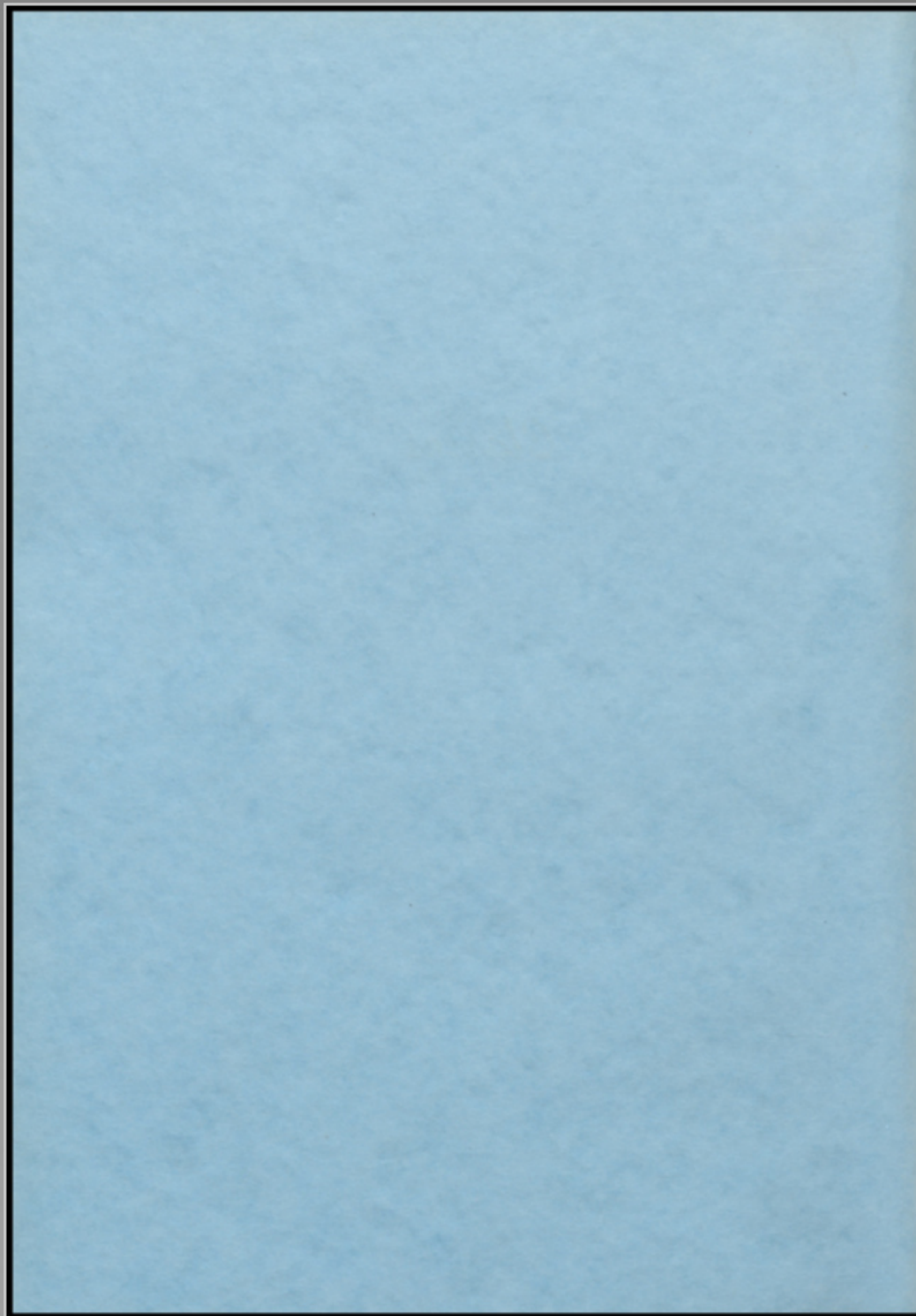

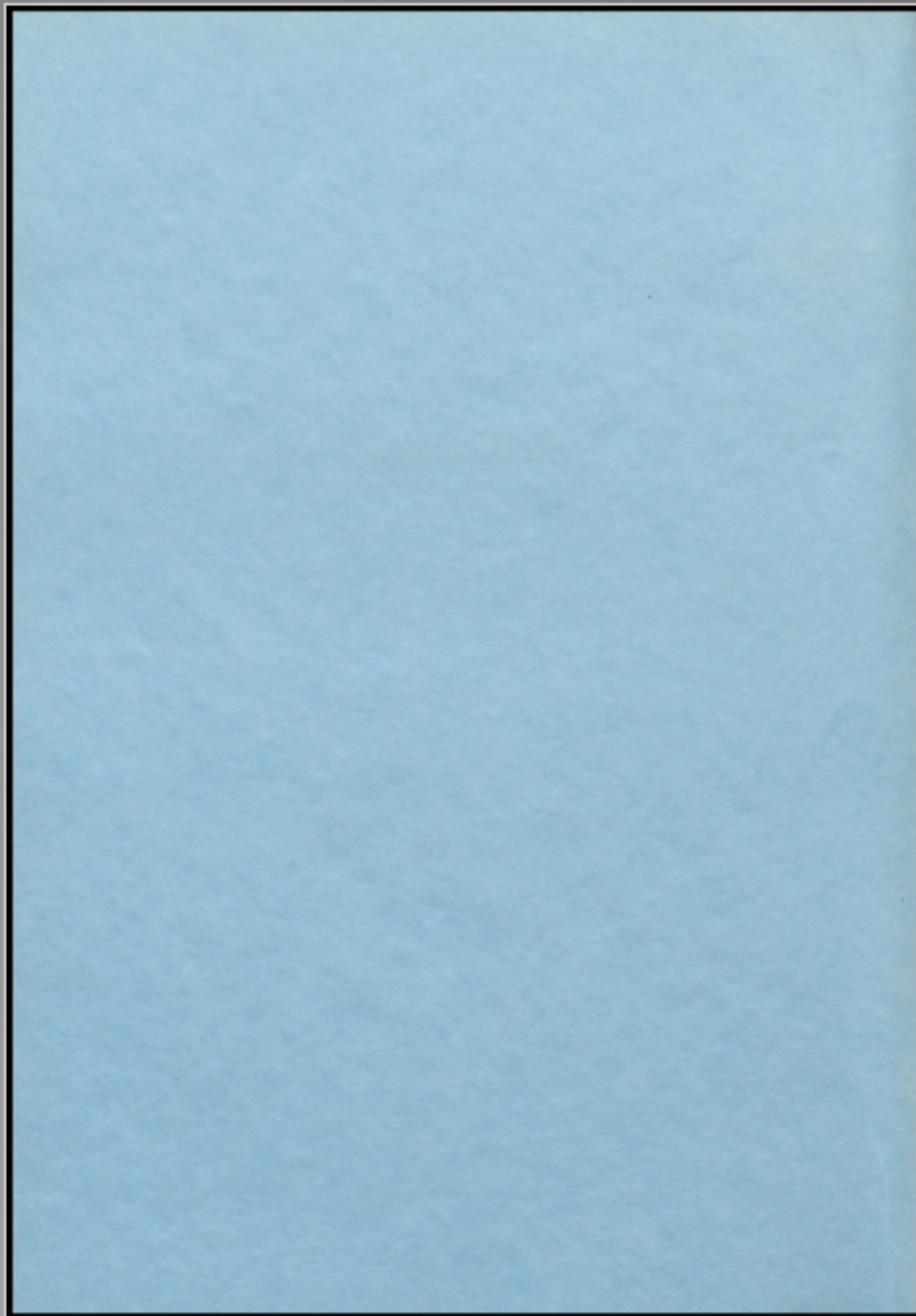

Juneau High School's Crimson Bears finished their basketball season this year with flying colors. 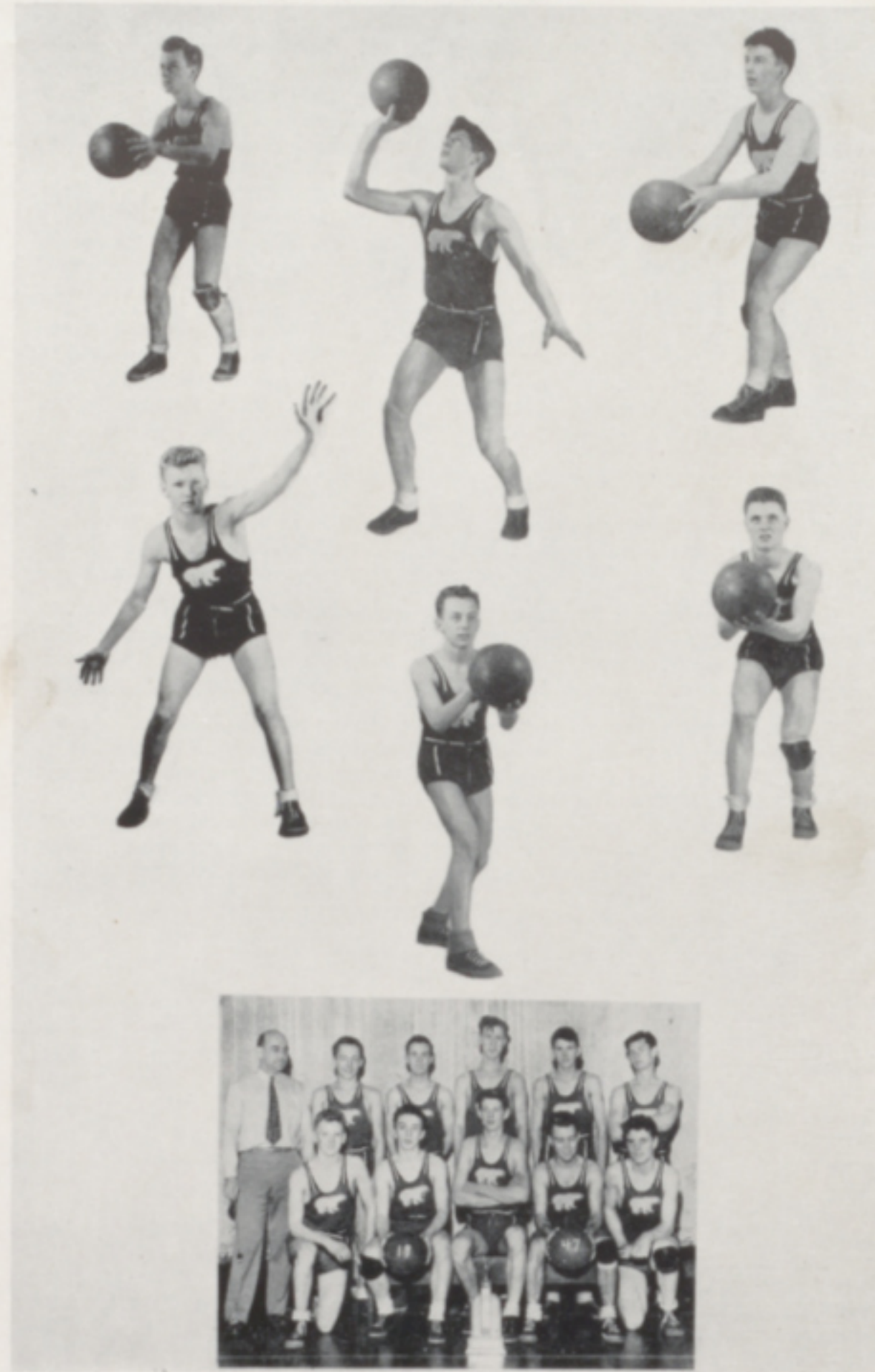
