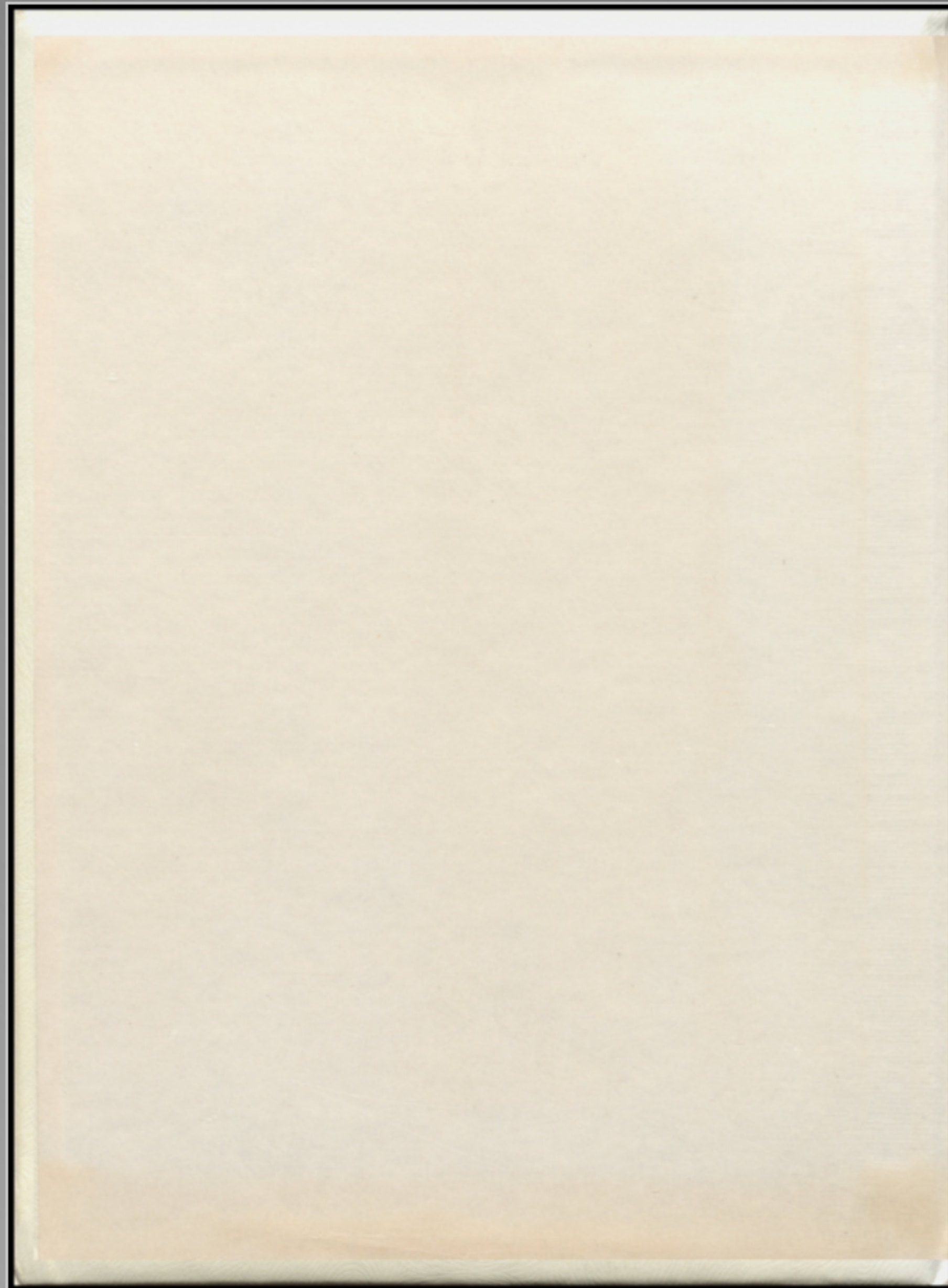
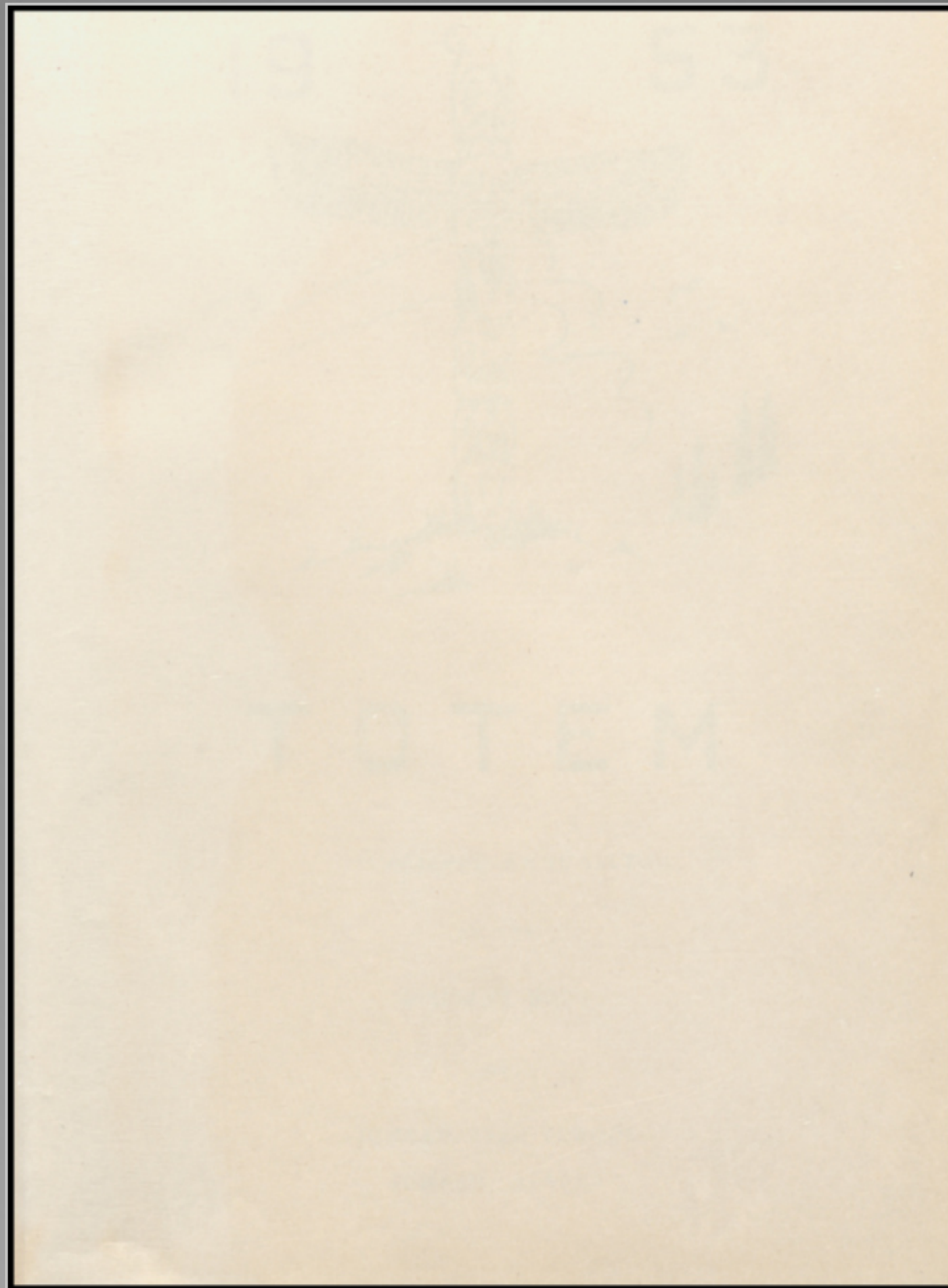


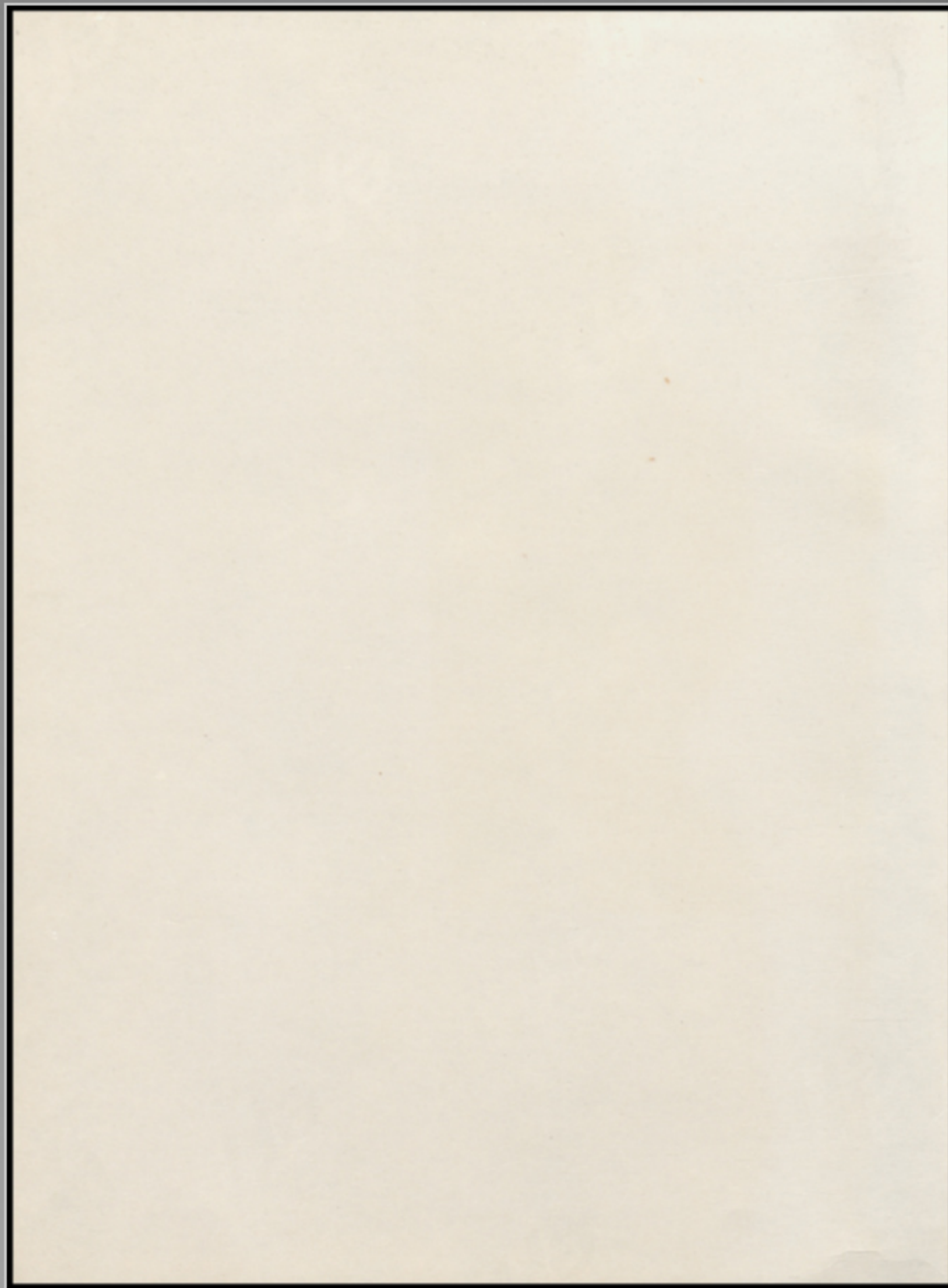

We, therefore, dedicate this Totem to Mr. Dryden not only for his assistance and encouragement in grade and high school but also for his continued interest in students after graduation.

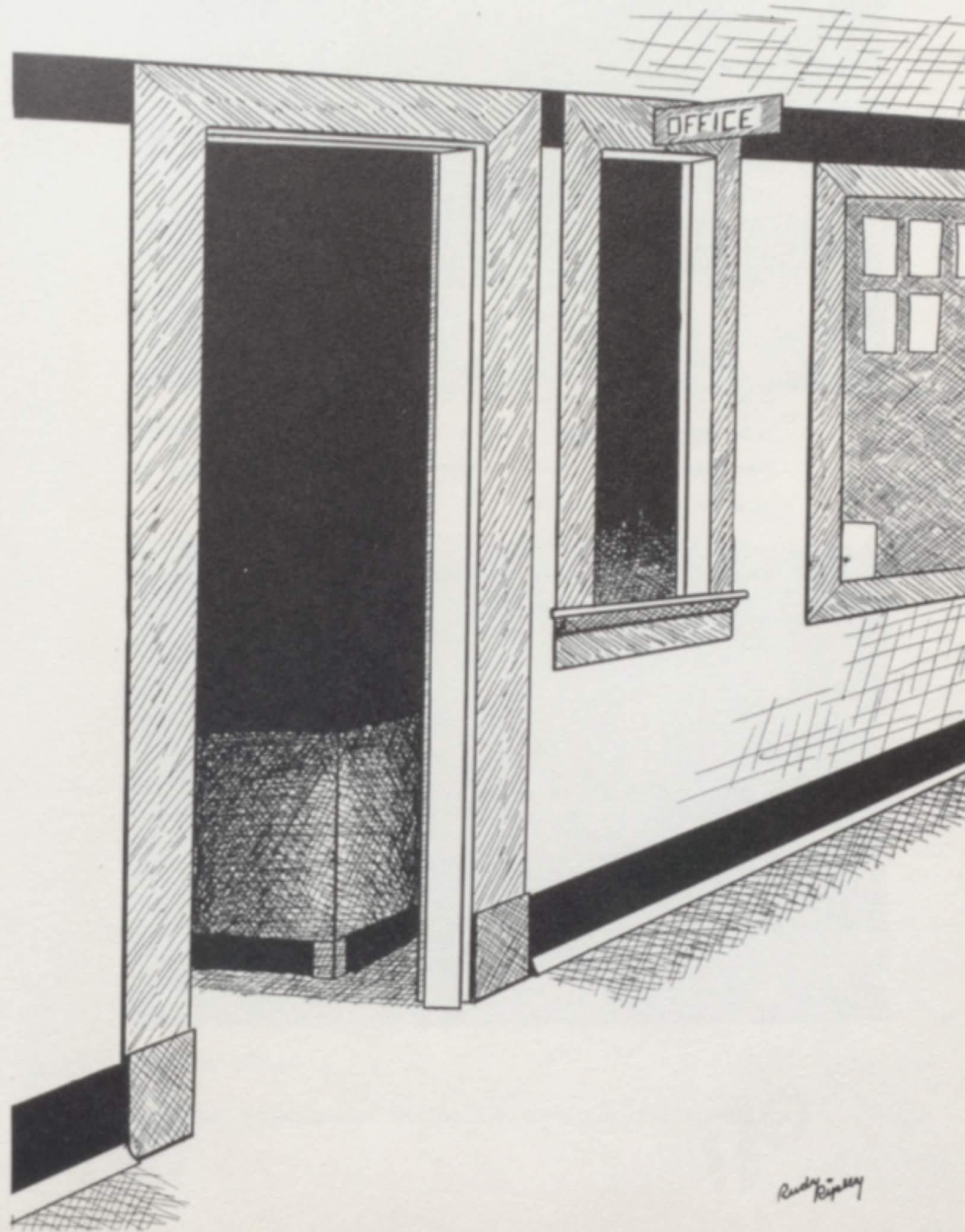

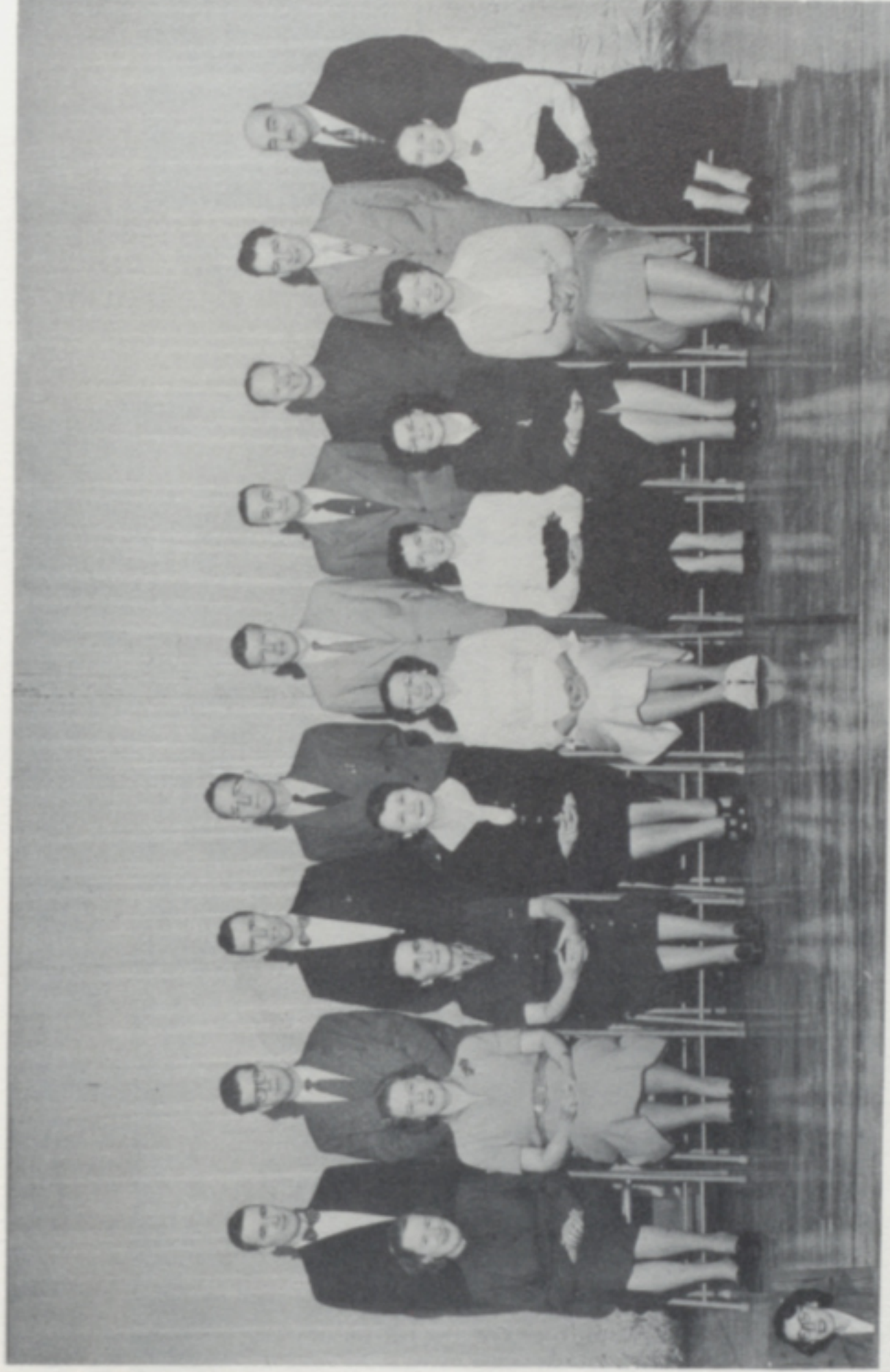

The Student Council swung into action as soon as school started this year by dealing with a small group of upper classmen who were illegally initiating freshmen.

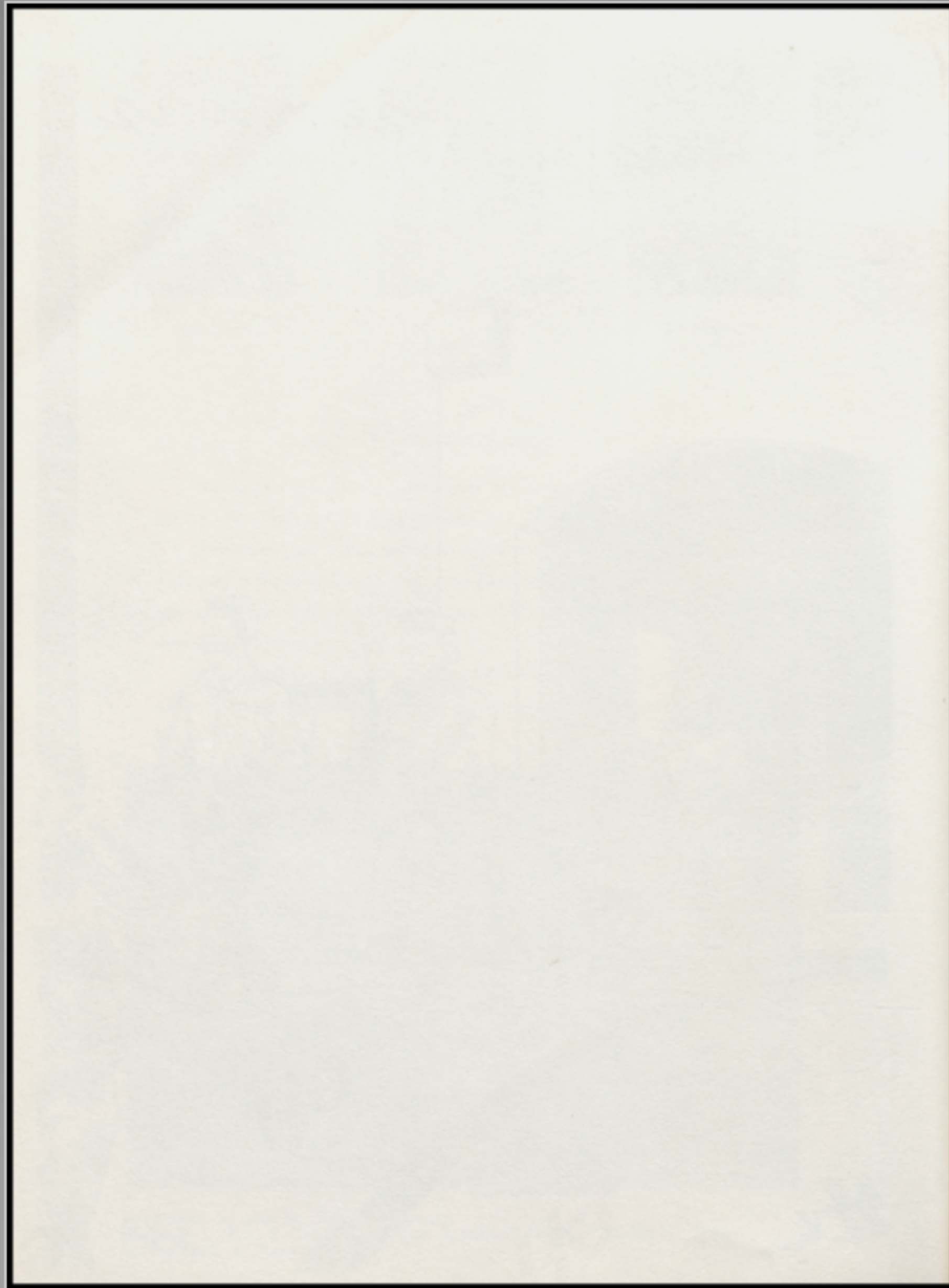

SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

These fields include basketball--BILL ORME, ELTON ENGSTROM, and GREG RIPKE; scholarship--BOB SECRIST and ELIZABETH WYLLER; G.A.A.--ALBERTA BARLOW and MEL CESAR; publications--GARY HEDGES and CAROLYN DEVOE; skiing--JACK GOULD and RONNIE HILDRE, and many other extracurricula organizations and activities.

This is certain; that, in one way or another, the class of '53 will be remembered for a long time by Juneau High School.

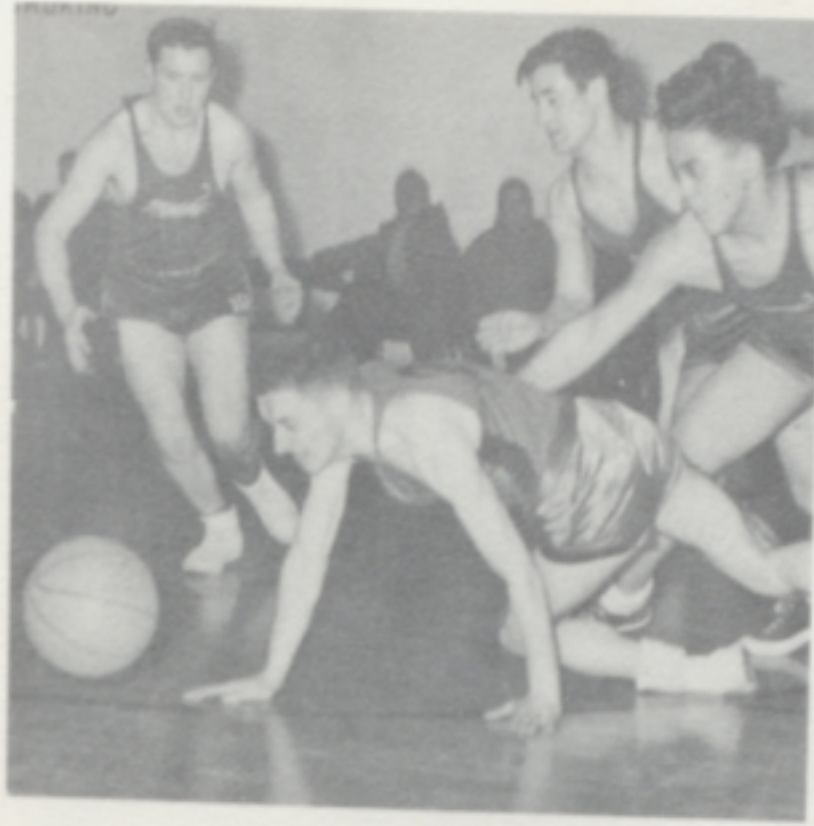

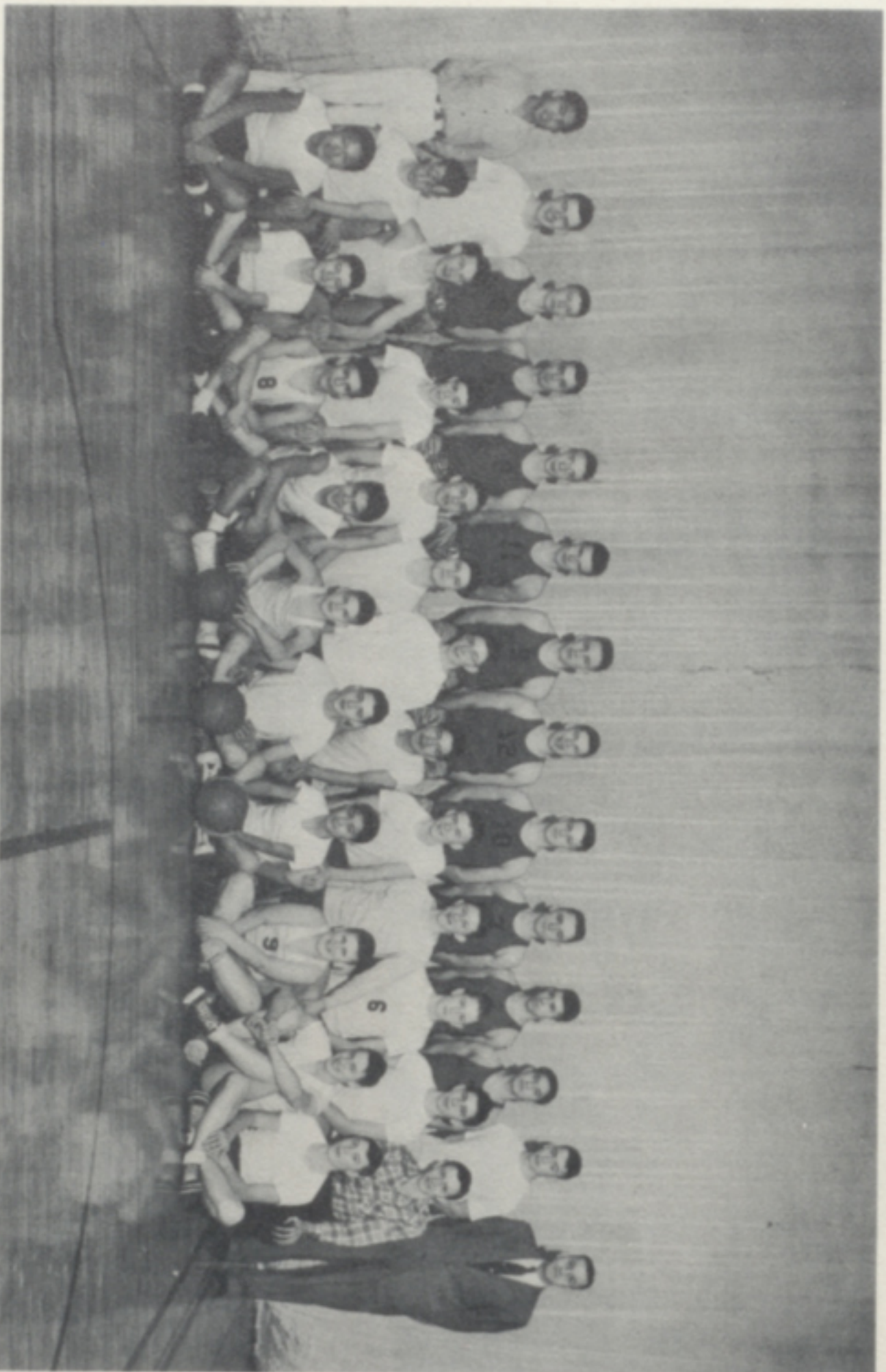
FRESHMAN CLASS

Entertainment, consisting of various interpretations of famous dancers helped make this year's Tolo most memorable.



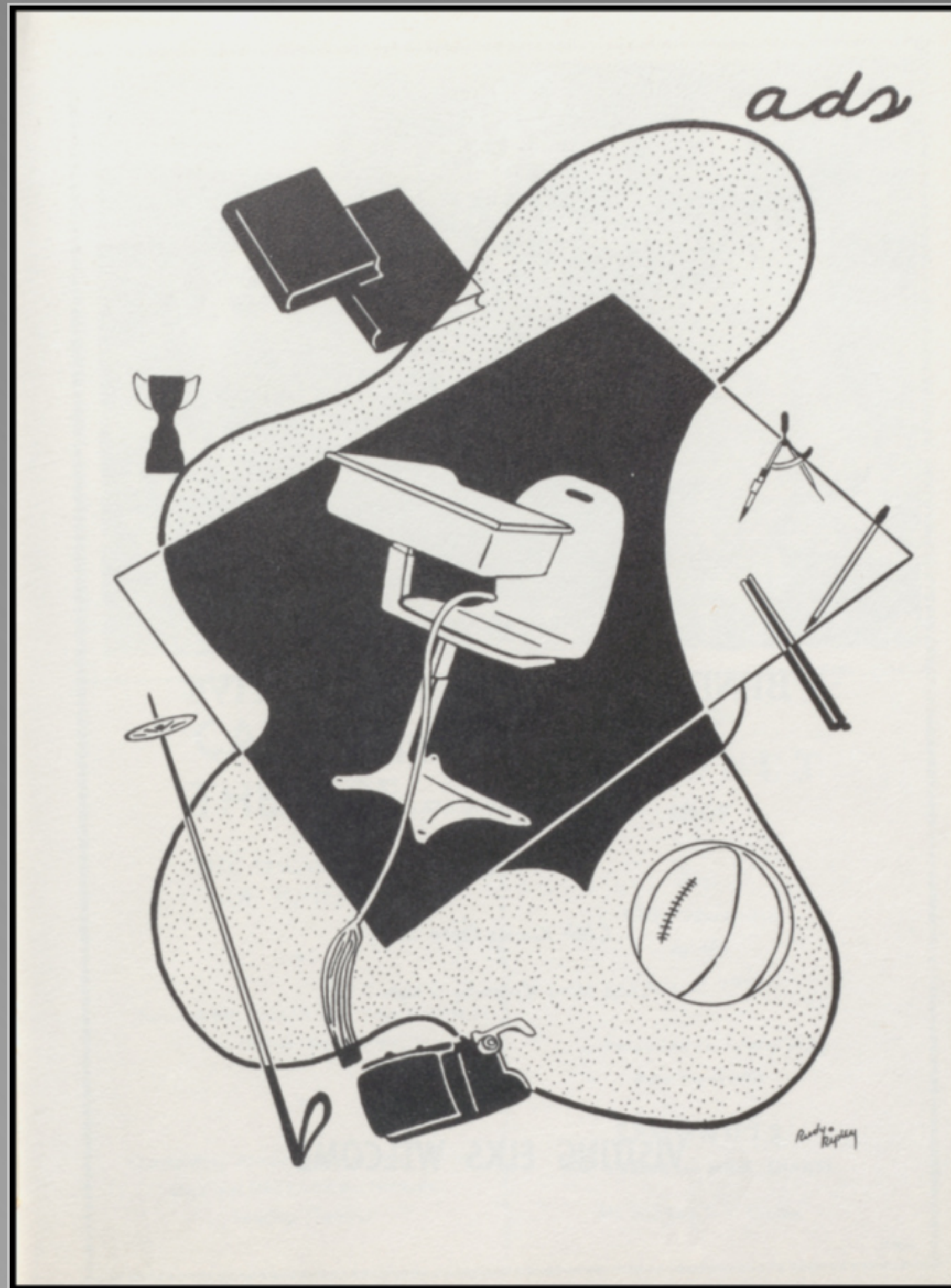

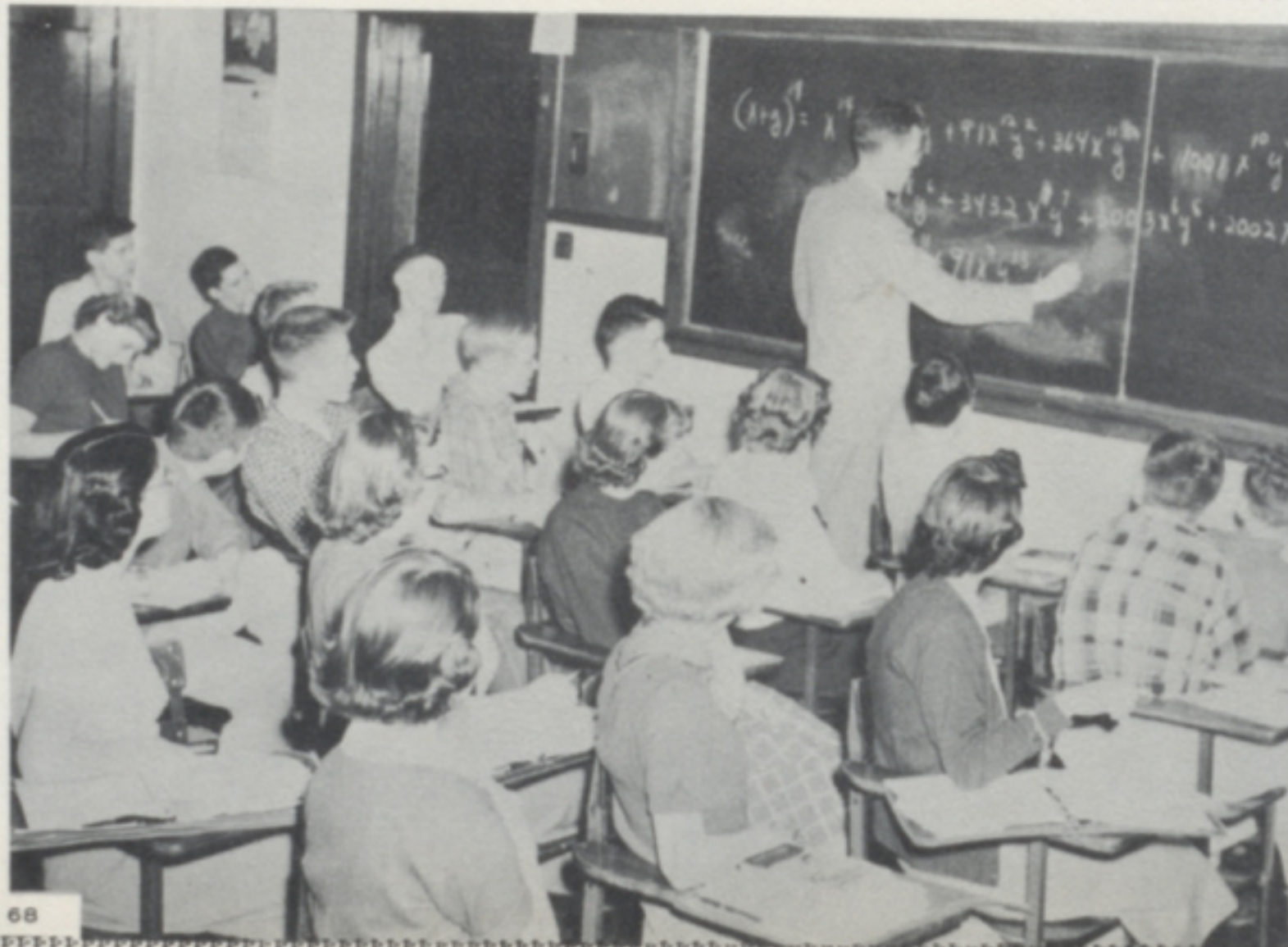

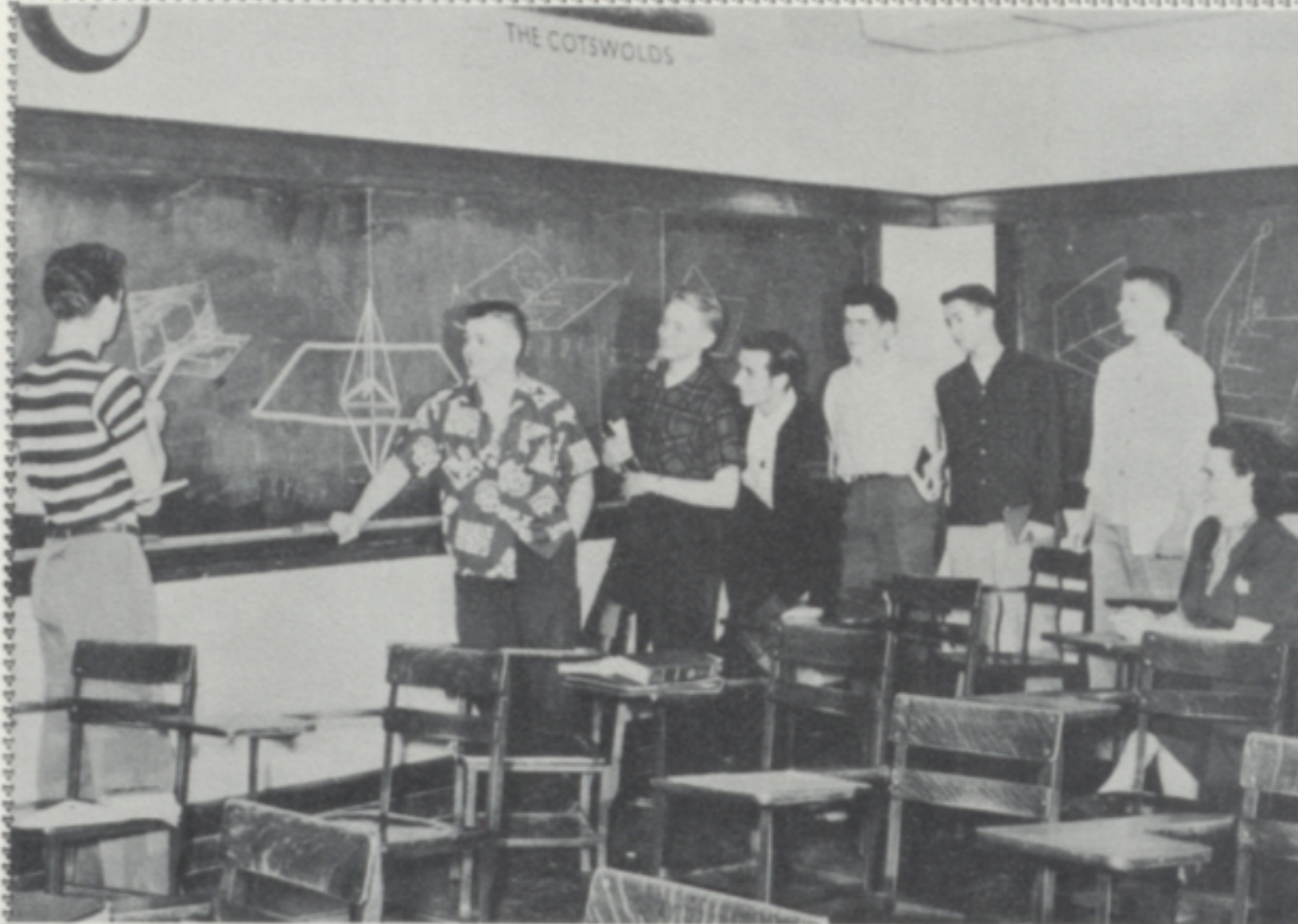
