 Their last year was marked by a splendid Senior Ball, the Senior Sneak, and the complete collapse of their fourth advisor. Then came graduation and, on May 22, 1953, forty-six proud seniors received their diplomas, amid noticeable sighs of relief from the surviving faculty.
