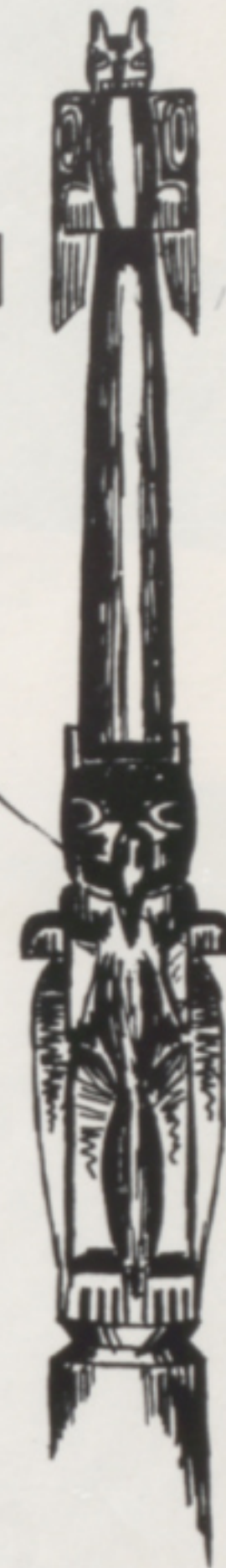
Foreword

Senior Class History

On J-Day, Carla Carter, Rose Mary Kronquist, Gwynne Hynson, Andy Hudert, and Bev and Merle Jack received their pin in G.A.A. Minor basketball letters were awarded to Allan Engstrom, Flip Leshner, Mike Wade, Morris Grant, and Jerry Rosenberger. Nancy Leege won two second-place awards in the annual home economics style show.

Across the channel, Lucile Isaak was elected sgt. at arms in Girls P. E. Club and Fred Stevens was recommended for the Carnegie Medal for Heroism, which he was awarded in March. The class sold candy to raise money for their treasury. Lois Good, Nellie Fowler, Anne Pusich, Dorothy Rice, Lucile Isaak, and Sharon Henkins took part in the P. E. Club's badminton tournament.

The class put on a play called "The Skeleton Walks" which featured many members of the class. Sophomore class officers were: president, Lois Good; vice president, Fred Stevens; secretary, Lucille Isaak, treasurer, Richard Pusich.

Mike Wade was elected President of the Juneau sophomore class and was assisted by Vice President-Sam McPhetres, Secretary-Margret Ann Pyle, and Treasurer-Elizabeth Shields. The all school play "The Night of January 16," found many sophomores in the cast. Several riflemen shot their way into Rifle Club that year. Pierre Sundborg and Bill DeArmond traveled to Petersburg with the debate team and Pierre placed second in the tournament.

Upperclassmen at last! J-Hi juniors elected Sam McPhetres-president, Helen Lister-vice pres., Carla Carter-secretary, and Joette Mihal-treasurer. The various activities of the class included participation in the school play, "And Came the Spring." Those who had parts were Elizabeth Shields, Mike Wade, Allan Engstrom, Margret Ann Pyle, Pierre Sundborg, Frank DeLand and Connie Brown. The Voice of Democracy Contest found Pierre Sundborg, Bill DeArmond, Virginia Walkley, and Mary Kay Cartmill competing. Pierre came out as second place winner in the territory wide contest. In basketball, Allan Engstrom, Mike Wade and Flip Leshner made the varsity basketball team.

South Sea Fantasy was the theme of the annual Junior Prom which was very successful. The student body elected Allan Engstrom-vice president, Nancy Leeger-assistant J-Bird editor, Elizabeth Shields-assistant Totem editor, and Pierre Sundborg-assistant business manager. Andy Hudert was elected vice president of G.A.A., Katy Delebecque was elected vice president of Girls' Club and Bob Whistler was elected vice president of Boys' Club.

Douglas juniors were very active. Nellie Fowler, Larry Boardman, Mary Anne Buchanan, Anne Pusich, Delores Bennett, and Lois Good had parts in the junior play, "Seventeen Is Awfully Young." Yogi Pusich was elected A.S.B. vice president, and Anne Pusich was elected assistant business manager of the Breeze. Jo Eubanks, editor of the Breeze, was awarded the N.S.P.A. Journyman pin along with Lois Good, Mary Anne Buchanan, and Anne Pusich. G.A.A. award winners were Jo Eubanks, Lucille Isaak, and Sharon Henkins. Fred Stevens, Ricky Smith, and Yogi Pusich were on the varsity basketball team. Ricky Smith was also on the track team.

The juniors gave a beautiful prom on April 9. The theme was Moonlight and Roses. The class also entertained the seniors with a banquet. The junior class officers were: President-Robert Fowler, vice president-Mary Anne Buchanan, treasurer-Yogi Pusich, student council representative-John Hoisington, and sgt. at arms-Larry Boardman.

These two active classes combined efforts for their senior year because of consolidation of the school district. Senior class officers were: president-Jerry Rosenberger, vice president-Yogi Pusich, secretary-Marilyn Tracy, treasurer-Delores Bennett.

Allan Engstrom was elected A.S.B. president, and Sharon Henkins was elected A.S.B. secretary-treasurer. Olaf Bartness was elected Rifle Club president, and Patsy Mantyla and Yvonne Guy were elected song queens. Andy Hudert was elected one of the cheerleaders. Flip Leshner, Fred Stevens, Mike Wade, Ricky Smith, Yogi Pusich, and Allan Engstrom all played on the varsity basketball team. Bill Baker coached the junior varsity and was the varsity's manager.

As this history goes to press, the class of '56 looks to the future and their traditional sneak and finally commencement.
