




FOREWORD

"WE Came, WE Saw, WE CONQUERED"

"It's hard to believe, but we're finally SENIORS!" were the sentiments expressed by the class of '57 as they entered their last year of high school. But they weren't always seniors. Let's travel back through the years and review their journey through high school.

In September, 1953, eighty-eight freshmen began their adventures in the hallowed halls of J-Hi. They were officially welcomed on Hell Day, a day that will long be remembered by these students. These eager freshmen elected Norman Clark, President; Jane Ninnis, Vice-President; Nancy Komatsubara, Secretary and Jim Harmon, Treasurer. Miss Irma Bobalko served as class advisor. A dance was held in the spring to raise money. Ronde Fleming represented the freshmen on the debate squad, and Joe Abel was on the ski team. The frosh basketball team won the intramural tourney.

Fifteen freshmen started their high school career in Douglas on September 6, 1953. Little did they dream, when being initiated, that they would graduate from Juneau High School. These ambitious freshmen chose as their officers: Stuart Johnson, President, Howie Hayes, Vice-President, Helen McIlhardy, Secretary and Valerie Smith, Treasurer, and Jim Tagart—Class Representative. Mr. Norman Moore served as class advisor. A few weeks after their initiation, they gave a successful Freshman Frolic.

When the Douglas sophomores entered their second year of high school, Mr. Moore was again their advisor. For class officers they elected: Howie Hayes, President; Ruth Jones, Vice-President; Valerie Smith, Secretary; Helen McIlhardy, Treasurer and Pat Isaak—class representative. An assembly was held where the sophs initiated the incoming frosh. The money-making projects for the year were selling pencils inscribed with the year's basketball schedule and selling ice cream bars at basketball games. Howie Hayes and Lester Henkins made a lively appearance on the basketball team, and Lester also made the track team.

Across the channel the Juneau sophomores were also active. For officers they elected: Bob Ogden, President; Jim Harmon, Vice-President, Page Wood, Secretary and Joe Abel, Treasurer. Mr. Frank Darnell acted as Class Advisor. The traditional Hell Day was very successful, and a dance was given for the incoming frosh. Bookcovers, designed by Susan Fritchman, were sold. Susan Blanton, Jane Ninnis, and Barbara Soley were elected as cheerleaders for our All-Alaska team that year. Warren Powers was the only soph on the varsity basketball team. Karyn Boggan, Bruce Miller, David McPhetres and Susan Blanton took part in the all-school play.

In their junior year these happy classes combined into one united group because of the consolidation of the Juneau and Douglas school districts. For class officers they elected: Pete McDowell, President; Mike Sweeney, Vice-President; Stuart Johnson, Secretary, and Nancy Komatsubara, Treasurer.
