
We feel our years at J-D High will be remembered for the good times and not the bad. It is time to move on so we the great class of '82 say thanks to all who made these three years some of the best of times.







Juneau then went on to the state tournament in Ketchikan November 14-16 placing 5th, two places higher than last year.

### Varsity Wrestling 1st in Southeast 3rd in State


The Crimson Bears wrestling team finished with an undefeated record in Southeast for the 1982 season.



## "Finians Rainbow" Chosen for Junior Class Musical








