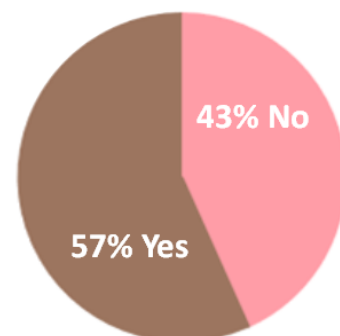

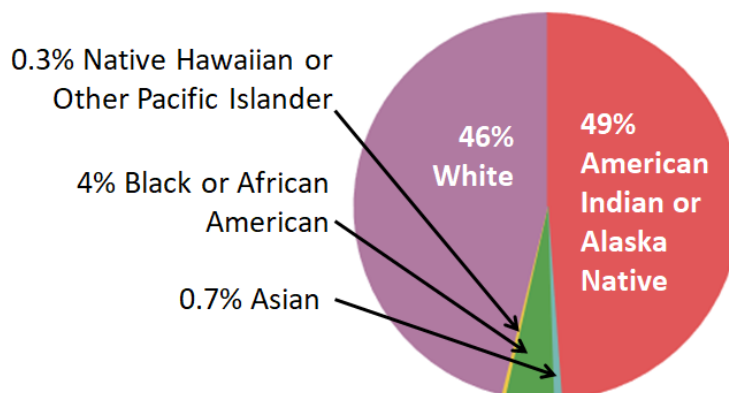

Project Homeless Connect (January 23, 2019):

About 230 people attended, 30 fewer than last year.

Among the 30+ agencies providing services was award-winning local chef Lionel Uddipa, who partnered with Glascholl Grinds on a lunch

comparable to Juneau's finest restaurants. Two furloughed federal workers volunteering for intake noted that it was the perfect activity to remind them how good they have it, despite the challenges they were facing at the time. Services available ranged from pet care to grooming to personal documents to housing.

Rapid Rehousing, with a Twist (January 2019): Family Promise Juneau is working with Saint Vincent de Paul and AWARE to aid individuals and families in quickly exiting homelessness and returning to permanent, stable housing. This proposal includes eviction prevention (complementary to existing rental assistance programs) that will save landlords money and keep our clients from having an eviction on their record. "Thank you" to the Fairbanks Housing and Homelessness Coalition, who graciously shared their rapid rehousing program development materials.
