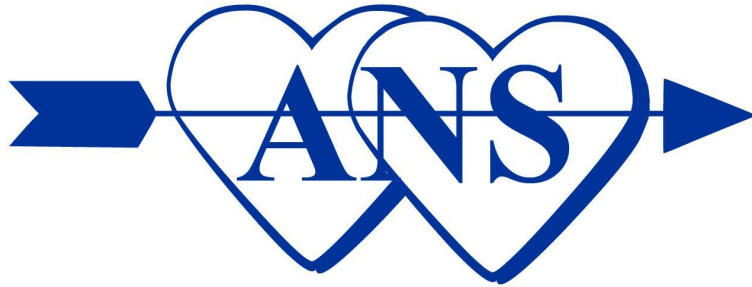

After returning to Sitka, where she was born, Paulette became involved during the 100th year anniversary of the ANB.

Her professional work includes over 30 years in the fields of native and civil rights advocacy. Paulette was training by the L.A. Law Center in ICWA, educational, and disability law advocacy. She worked for Cook Inlet Native Association, Kern Indian Education Program and Sitka Tribe of Alaska. Staying true to her creative spirit she has written and performed with Medicine Dream's native right's inspired band. She is a spoken word artist and poet. She is now working on her mother Harriet's story as a young girl growing up in Wrangell.

Paulette is the mother of 2 beautiful daughters, Shaleena and Marissa, she is the very busy grandmother of 6 grandchildren. The closest reason to her heart for us to keep up the good fight for all generations.
