## **Proposed Additional Best Practices for TBMP 2026**

### **1) North Douglas Highway**

Drivers recognize that the North Douglas Highway is heavily used as a community road as well as a recreation destination for locals and visitors, with the shoulder of the road frequently used for dog walking, pedestrian walking and jogging, and for bikers, roller skiers, berry pickers, and hunters. Taking into consideration traffic rules and neighborhood sensitivity, and neighborhood uses along the road, drivers agree to transit North Douglas Highway in a safe manner avoiding conflicts with local users and agree to operate in a safe manor including:

- Drivers shall not exceed the 45 mph, and agree to operate at below the speed limit when necessary.
- Watch for drivers backing out of their driveways directly onto the highway.
- Being extremely cautious and watching carefully for children, pets and wild animals who often cross or even dart into the highway.
- No tourists through subdivisions (Bonnie Brae, Bayview Subdivision) and be very cautious of the intersections for Fishcreek Road, Eaglecrest road, Ninemile Creek, Fishcreek Park, and the North Douglas boat ramp.
- Use increased caution around frequent school buses and school children crossing the road.

### **2) North Douglas Boat Launch Area**

- Commercial operators and clients that use North Douglas Highway should give right of way to local users. Abrupt stopping or temporary parking in the main road or shoulder should be avoided. If a line forms behind them the vehicle should pull over in the next pullout.
- A copy of all tourist permits that use North Douglas Highway should be provided to the CBJ and forwarded to the North Douglas Neighborhood Association.

### **3) Fish Creek Park and Trails**

Commercial use of the Fish Creek Park and trails are not permitted. Fish Creek Park and Trails are heavily used for fishing, dog walking, berry picking, birding and school field trips, and more.

### **4) Pioneer Road**

Commercial use of Pioneer Road is not permitted, as it is heavily used by Juneau residents for hunting, berry picking, hiking, dog walking, running, and more.
